**Local Intelligence.**

**BECKINGRIDGE MEETING AT BELVIDERE HALL.**—This meeting was well attended, and boys of all parties, and the organ music of the Breckinridge distentionists was a perfect success. The meeting had been called to give Mr. Ritchie, a Breckinridge elector a hearing on the issues of the present campaign. Before Mr. Ritchie was introduced Gen. McKaig essayed to instruct the listening multitude with upturned faces were staring at the intellectual constellation which adorned the stage. **His Honor Judge Perry** in his charge to the Grand Jury at the commencement of the present term, among other matters in which the public is interested, mentioned that the Court of Appeals had recently decided that all recognizances made to appear in Court for criminal behavior, and conditioned for the personal appearance of the party at the County Court, were void—as such recognizances as a County Court being known in this State.—His Honor also stated that he had examined the recognizances returned to this (October) Court, and found many of them invalid, because of the condition requiring the party to appear at that Court.—That he supposed the reason influencing the magistrates to adhere to that language has arisen from the fact, that such is the form and condition of the recognizance given in Lathrop's Justice a law book published by John H. B. Latrobe, Esq. of the Baltimore bar. In that book the author does not observe the requirement of the decision of the Appellate Court. As all such recognizances are void, his Honor thought it not only proper but his duty, and to advise, in so far as he could, Justices of the Peace, and that in future they might observe the proper precedent and form. The law requires that the condition shall be to appear to the Circuit Court on a day, &c., as such is the name and style of the law tribunal in Maryland. In the absence of proper recognizances, criminals and offenders may escape that punishment which public justice and the interest of society demand.

**James Gwyners and others vs. Jas. D. Armstrong.**—Ejectment. This suit was brought to recover possession of certain land in this county by parties residing in the West Indies, under the will of the late father, who died some years ago in the Island of Barbadoes. The new, leaving a will, and several illegitimate children, together with a motley train of dependants. The land in question was escheated many years ago, and was claimed as defendant's property. The main question for discussion was whether the plaintiffs being aliens, could take and recover a devise in this country.—The Court decided they could. The case goes to the Court of Appeals.

**Deeken vs. A. J. Shepherd.** Action for slander. Statute of limitation, pleaded.—Case went out of Court on the pleadings.—Judgment for defendant. This case also goes to the Court of Appeals.

**Commonwealth vs. Alex. Sloan.**—This was an action for trespass for taking some old iron on the Detrolid railroad. Verdict and judgment for defendant.

**Commonwealth vs. Nally, Cumberland and Pennsylvania Railroad Co.**—Action for damages resulting from injuries received by plaintiff on the defendants railroad as a conductor on one of its trains. Plaintiff demanded to testify in his own defense, and to cross-examine defendant's witnesses. The Court refused to allow him to do so, and postponed his trial till the 20th inst. This case excites a great deal of interest at Mount Savage, where all the parties reside.

**James Smith vs. Charles McBlair.**—Action for recovery of money expended by plaintiff upon the farm of defendant as his agent. This case is still under way, and promises to be very tedious and lengthy. There are over 60 witnesses in attendance, and no doubts it will be the trial of the term.
