**To the Voters of Allegany County.**  
FELLOW-CITIZENS—I wish to be a member of the next House of Delegates, and if you honor me with an election, you may rest assured that in executing the trust I shall give you no cause to regret your choice. I think I understand the hearts of the people of Allegany County—at least, I will say, I think I understand the hearts of my democratic fellow citizens of the county; and I therefore feel justified in saying for them, no less than for myself, that although there is much to humiliate our national pride in the present unhappy condition of our country, yet we still cling with hope and affection to the Government of the United States—trusting that the desolating march of civil war which is now afflicting us with its destructive and heart-rending consequences, will soon be happily by the restoration of Union and harmony amongst the States, and in the consequent enjoyment of all the rights and privileges which are guaranteed to us and to our sister States by our existing Federal Constitution.  
Should I be elected a member of the House of Delegates, before I can enter upon the duties of such office, our State Constitution requires me to take and subscribe an oath of which the words following are a part, to wit: "I, Samuel M. Semmes, do swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of Maryland, and support the Constitution and Laws thereof; and that I will to the best of my skill and judgment, diligently and faithfully without partiality or prejudice, execute the office of member of the House of Delegates according to the Constitution and laws of this State."  
In connection with this oath, our State Constitution declares that "any person sworn to in the premises, shall, on conviction thereof in a court of law, incur the penalties for wilful and corrupt perjury."  
In respect then to the question whether our National Constitution shall be upheld or destroyed, you see from the oath which a member of our House of Delegates is required to take before he can enter upon the duties of his office, that he is not only not at liberty to apply for or to consent to any legislation having for its object a separation of the States as united under our Federal Constitution, but that it is made his duty in regard to all such legislation to support the Constitution of the United States, and to support the Constitution of the United States.

Men, I know, of the old nullification school of politics used to contend, that to support the Constitution of the United States is to support a man to support the Constitution is to understand it, and therefore, if he understood the Constitution of the United States as conceding the right of Secession to the different States to be exercised by them separately pleasure, then it was not a violation of his oath to take the part of his State, should he renounce all obedience to the authority of the Union, and claim to act as a separate sovereign nation. But deriving my knowledge of the Constitution from the teachings of Madison, Marshall, Webster, Taney and other great and good men whose expiations of the Constitution are respected as controlling authorities, my appreciation of the oath to support the Constitution would oblige me not only to reject all nullification doctrine, but to regard the language of Washington to discountenance whatever may suggest even a suspicion that our National Union can in any event be abandoned.

In conclusion, I will take the liberty of advising my democratic fellow citizens to support their party organization, and to avoid all new party names. Democracy, to me, is a time honored name, whose triumphs as detailed in history have thrilled my mind with delight, notwithstanding its occasional derangement and sad wanderings; it is truly the most eloquent of all political non-substantive men, eloquence as it does that form of government where the people are the sovereign, and where public officers instead of being the masters are only recognized as the servants of the people, to whom they are accountable and by whom they are punishable for all abuses of their respective trusts. The name of the democratic union, nothing in it at all inconsistent with unionism, unconditional unionism or peace partyism. We are all friends of the Union—all anxious for the speedy restoration of peace to our distracted country. I wish to see the day when at the call of the Chief Magistrate of the United States, our Christian Churches of all denominations were opened, and the people of all parties united in prayer for God for the return of Union and peace to our Nation, and that God should speedily grant our prayer, I am sure, at the present time, the nearest wish of every patriot's heart.

So it is; the school has lost all the importance as an institution of learning it ever enjoyed in our midst, and threatens now to become a nuisance that will require to be abated.

Should the voters of this county think with me that the fund of \$200 now paid to the Academy should be transferred to the Common School fund of our county for the benefit of all, instead of being enjoyed by a few pet boys in this town, they can vote for me at the coming election, and if elected I can quite certainly make the change and transfer said fund to the Common School fund of our county, doing which, at least, will not increase the tax.

The support of the voters of this county has on two previous occasions been so liberally bestowed upon me, I feel it will be asking almost too much of them to come to my rescue again, and only for the local issue I have mentioned to have been before you now.
