Peter Staup and Daniel M. In the Circuit Court for Allegany County, Staup, Administrators of George Staup, dec'd. vs. Jerry Cowles, Joseph B. Varney, William H. Aspinwall, Charles Edward Hill, R. Anderson, Geo. Grand, George C. Sterley, non residents, & the widow and heir at law of George Staup and other residents.

THE object of this suit is to procure a decree in favor of certain lands and premises in Allegany County, Maryland, which were sold by George Staup, in his life time, to Jerry Cowles, Charles Edward Hill, R. Anderson, Geo. Grand, George C.
