**County Levy, 1862.**  
 IN compliance with the provision of Section 19 of Article 28 of the Code of Public General Laws of Maryland, the following statement of the levy for 1862, to meet the current expenses of the County for that year, is herewith submitted and published by the direction of the County Commissioners of Allegany County:  
 The whole levy amounts to the aggregate sum of \$87,776.36, for the payment of which forty cents in each hundred dollars, upon the assessed property in said County, were levied, which assessment amounts to \$8,938,740 for the present year, exceeding that of the last year \$873,776. The assessment stands at a higher figure now than at any previous time since the general assessment of 1862. This large increase is the result of much pains and labor on the part of the Commissioners, in putting upon the County books property and persons heretofore unassessed. It is proper to state that \$58,000 of the above was returned by the late Collector. It will be seen that a State and County tax of \$2,429 will be thus secured not before realized.  
 The per centage for 1862 exceeds that of the previous year six cents in the hundred dollars for the County tax. This increase is owing to the insufficient levies of 1861, and particularly those for the roads, which in connection with several freshets within the last nine months have rendered extraordinary levies for that purpose absolutely necessary. The amount appropriated at the late session for the roads amounts to \$7,430; for 1861 it was only \$2,847; \$1,500 were levied for the use of the City of Cumberland in accordance with a long established usage, but this levy was withheld from the city for the last year or two. Had the latter levy been refused, and that for the roads been kept at the amount of last year, the per centage for the County tax would have been less than 34 cents in the hundred dollars—which was the levy for the year 1861.  
 The present levy for the State tax is twenty-five cents in the hundred dollars. It was put at that rate by the act of 1862, chapter 195.
