A LIST of all persons enrolled in class I, in the different Election Districts of Allegany county, has been posted up in at least five places in the District where the party enrolled resides. It is to be seen in pursuance of the provisions of the Provost Marshal General's Department, contained in the regulations which provide, as amended, that the party enrolled in class I, before the 1st day of January 1864, before the Provost Marshal, and claim to have his name on the list if he can show to the satisfaction of the board that he is now, and will not be at the time fixed for the next draft, liable to military duty, on account of any one of the following causes, viz:

- 1st. Alienage.
- 2d. Non-residence.
- 3d. Unsoundness of age.
- 4th. Manifest permanent Physical Disability.

The above causes, and the election by aged and infirm persons, having two or more sons subject to military duty, will be the only claims entertained by the board, before the draft takes place.

Persons who may be cognizant of any citizen liable to military duty, whose name does not appear on the Enrollment List, as published in the printed list of enrolled men posted up in the different Election Districts of Allegany county, are requested to notify the Board of Enrollment, or Daniel Duncan, Esq., the deputy Provost Marshal for the county, at Cumberland, on the enrollment office for the district where the citizen resides, of such omission, without delay.
