Local Intelligence.

THE BALTIMORE AND OHIO RAILROAD.

—We quote the following paragraph from the Baltimore Clipper of Monday last:

On Friday, Major General Grant, accompanied by four members of his staff, arrived here from the front of Petersburg in a few hours in company with General Wallace, took a special train and visited Harper's Ferry, where he consulted with the Generals in command of the troops stationed on or near the line of the B. & O. road.

That this consultation will result in the reconstruction of the road, or at least tend to advance that desirable achievement cannot be but little doubt. The military commanders have also had interviews with the principal officers of the Railroad Company, with a view to such a disposition of their forces as will guarantee protection to the working parties whilst rebuilding the damaged sections of the track, and a safeguard when the regular business of the main stem shall have been resumed.

On the average, this exemption is worth about two per cent. per annum, according to the rate of taxation in various parts of the country.

It is believed that no securities offer so great inducements to lenders as those issued by the government. In all other forms of indebtedness, the faith or ability of private parties, or stock companies, or separate communities, only is pledged for payment, while the whole property of the country is held to secure the discharge of all the obligations of the United States.

While the government offers the most liberal terms for its loans, it believes that the very strongest appeal will be to the loyalty and patriotism of the people.

Duplicate certificates will be issued for all deposits. The party depositing must endorse upon the original certificate the denomination of notes required, and whether they are to be issued in blank or payable to order. When so enclosed it must be left with the officer receiving the deposit, to be forwarded to the Treasury Department.

Subscriptions will be received by the Treasurer of the United States, at Washington, the several Assistant Treasurers and designated Depositories, and by all National Banks which are depositories of public money, and ALL RESPECTABLE BANKS AND BANKERS throughout the country will give further information and AFFORD EVERY FACILITY TO SUBSCRIBERS.

CHILD KICKED BY A HORSE.—A little daughter of Mr. Jos. P. Johnson, was severely kicked in the head by a horse on Saturday evening last. The child has since died from her injury.

THE INCOME TAX and THE EXPRESS COMPANIES.—A decision recently made in the United States Circuit Court of New York in relation to the Income Tax, will be of interest to all persons who hold stock in Express Companies. It has been claimed that the dividends received upon stock issued by Express Companies were exempt from the Income Tax. A suit was brought against a collector to test the question, and the court has decided that the dividends are subject to the tax. The effect of the decision will be to put the stockholders in Express Companies upon the same footing as regards Income Tax, as stockholders in railroads and steamboats, and there is no apparent reason why they should not be so.—Y. F. Times.

AREAS are said to be so abundant in Western Maryland, Pa., that persons having orchards shake a great many off in order to keep the trees from breaking, and in some parts they are feeding them to the cattle, the supply being so great they have no other way to dispose of them. They are now selling at twenty-five cents per bushel.

U. S. 7-30 LOAN

The Secretary of the Treasury gives notice that subscriptions will be received for Coupon Treasury Notes, payable three years from Aug. 15th 1864, with semi-annual interest at the rate of seven and three-tenths per cent. per annum, principal and interest both to be paid in lawful money.

These notes will be convertible at the option of the holder at maturity, into six per cent. gold bearing bonds, payable not less than five nor more than twenty years from their date, as the Government may elect. They will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1,000 and \$5,000, and all subscriptions must be for fifty dollars or some multiple of fifty dollars.

The notes will be transmitted to the owners free of transportation charges as soon after the receipt of the original Certificates of Deposit as they can be prepared.

As the notes draw interest from August 15, persons making deposits subsequent to that date must pay the interest accrued from date of note to date of deposit.

Parties depositing twenty-five thousand dollars and upwards for these notes at any one time will be allowed a commission of one-quarter of one per cent., which will be paid by the Treasury Department upon the receipt of a bill for the amount, certified to by the officer with whom the deposit was made. No deductions for commissions must be made from the deposits.
