In Memoriam. At a meeting of the members of the Allegany County Bar, held in the city of Cumberland, on the 21st day of December, A. D. 1884, the Hon. Thomas Petty was called to the chair, and J. W. Robinette, Esq., appointed Secretary. The sad intelligence of the death of Thomas Devoe, a leading member of our bar, and a prominent citizen of our county, which took place at 3 o'clock A. M., on the 21st ult., at his residence in this city, was announced in appropriate terms.

On motion of Gen. Thomas I. McKays, the chair was empowered to appoint a committee of four to draft suitable resolutions.

Whereupon the following gentlemen were named as said committee, viz: Gen. Thomas I. McKays, J. Philip Iowan, Josiah H. Gordon and George A. Peare.

The following preamble and resolutions were reported by said committee and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, By a sudden disposition of an all-wise Providence, our professional brother, Thomas Devoe, has been taken from our midst, be it therefore

Resolved, That we deeply deplore his loss and sincerely regret that the bright professional career, which his fine talents as a lawyer and his high order of intellect had just opened to him, should have so prematurely closed, and as he was with genius, generous impulses and high legal attainments.

Resolved, That we tender to his bereaved family, and especially to his afflicted wife, our sincerest sympathy for the great loss which they and she have sustained.

Resolved, That we, the members of the Bar, in connection with his professional and life commended and ended, as a mark of our high appreciation of his character and taken of respect for his memory, will wear a badge of mourning for thirty days.

Resolved, That the Chairman of this meeting present these Resolutions to the Circuit Court for Allegany County, with the request to have the same entered upon its Minutes; that he cause them to be published in the several newspapers of this city, and that he present a copy thereof to the family of the deceased.
