CHAPTER 11.

A Bill entitled, AN ACT to add additional sections to Article 11 of the Code of Public Local Laws for Allegheny County, relating to the drawing and numbering of Jurors, is in said County.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted, That the duty of the Judge of the Orphans' Court of Allegheny County, in conjunction with the Judge of the Circuit Court of said county, at such day in each year as shall be fixed by the Court, shall be to select the names of three hundred and thirty citizens of said county, to be divided into three equal parts...

SECTION 2. Be it enacted, That in order to assist said Judges of the Orphans' and Circuit Courts in making the list of names aforesaid, the Clerk of said county shall, on or before the first day of July next, after the passage of this act, and every second year thereafter, lodge with the Register of Wills of said county, a certified list of taxable male white citizens of each election district of said county...

SECTION 3. Be it enacted, That the said Judges, or some one appointed by them, and in their presence shall draw, and in the presence of the Clerk of said county, prior to the commencement of the several terms of the Circuit Court for said county, shall open the said box in the presence of the Clerk of said Circuit Court, or his deputy, and the Clerk of said county, and shall draw one by one, forty-eight names or ballots from said box, for the October and April terms of said Circuit Court, and twenty-four names or ballots for each of the other terms of said county...

SECTION 4. Be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of said Clerk of said county, to cause each of the names drawn as aforesaid, to be ascertained, to issue a summons for the persons whose names are upon such lists, directed to the Sheriff of said county, directing him to summon the persons whose names are upon said lists, to serve as Jurors at the next ensuing term of said Circuit Court.

SECTION 5. Be it enacted, That in case of the disqualification of any Juror, or of his death, or removal from said county of any of the persons whose names are upon said list, the Clerk of said county shall thereupon immediately draw other names in the manner herebefore directed from said box.

Be it enacted, That in case of the disqualification of any Juror, or of his death, or removal from any other cause, the Judge of said Circuit Court, to select from the original list of names drawn as aforesaid, such Juror, or Jurors, as he shall think proper to summon in his stead, from the lists furnished to him by the Clerk of said county.
