Governor Pierpont submitted a message to the Legislature of Virginia on Tuesday, the chief part of which is his recommending that the test oath contained in the Alexandria Constitution, excluding from voting those who have voluntarily assisted the rebellion since January 1, 1864, be repealed, placing those who have endeavored to subvert the Government of the United States on the same footing with those who have been fighting to sustain it.

The suggestion meets the approbation of the Richmond press. In accordance with the proposition of the Governor, a bill was reported in the House of Delegates on Tuesday for the restoration of political rights to those who have heretofore enjoyed them.

It provides that each and every person, before voting, shall subscribe to the late annexity proclamation of President Johnson, with the oath contained therein in relation to slavery, and the oath to support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution and government of Virginia as established at Wheeling and restored in the city of Richmond. The bill was ordered to be printed.

Yesterday a large delegation of loyal Virginians visited President Johnson in relation to the policy being pursued by Governor Pierpont. A letter from General Wells, Provost Marshal of the defence south of the Potomac was submitted, in which he states that soon after the fall of Richmond he became aware that many of the leading Secessionists of Virginia, despairing of resisting the Government by force of arms, by the events which were soon to make Virginia free, determined to attempt by policy what they could not do by force.
