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FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

Of the Ex-Board of the Association for the Relief of the Poor of Cumberland, presented at the English Lutheran Church, Monday Evening Nov. 13th 1865.

The Ex-Board in presenting this, their First Annual Report to the Association and the citizens of Cumberland beg leave to state, that after a public call by the Mayor in December 1864, and several ineffectual attempts to organize, a permanent organization was formed, and the officers and managers appointed, some of whom, however, declined to act, but their place being filled, the following gentlemen performed the duties assigned them as best they could, considering the embarrassing circumstances by which they were surrounded, viz: W. R. McCulley, Pres., Geo. Bragonier, Sec'y., J. B. H. Campbell Treasurer, and Messrs. Steiner, Brant, Bush, Bloomer, Say, Adler, Webber, Boward, Haller and Rizer as managers—thus constituting the Ex-Board.

The Treasurer reports as having received the following amounts in cash: From District No. 1 24.00, No. 2 34.00, No. 3 16.65, No. 4 140.75, No. 5 102.25, No. 6 49.00, J. Rhind Esq., Treas. 49.00, Total cash receipts amounting to \$422.03, Disbursements per order of Ex-Board 238.35, Leaving a balance of cash on the Treasury of \$183.68.

In addition to the above cash receipts, the following articles were received for the object of the association 87.19-20 tons coal from the officers and miners of the Consolidation Coal Company, and one barrel flour from a member of the Association.

The said coal was mined and the transportation furnished free of charge, and this free will offering from these good hearted men, who have not forgotten that we have the poor always with us, speaks to all showing a worthy example after which to pattern this present winter.

55.9-28 tons of this donation is still on hand and at ready for distribution. The following details of disbursements in several Districts of the town, as per reports of the managers from each are submitted.

From District No. 1.—(No report.) From District No. 2.—Three families were relieved with 40 bushels coal, 40 lbs flour, 2 lbs bacon, 2 lbs coffee and 4 lbs sugar.

From District No. 3.—Three families were relieved with 45 bushels coal, 90 lbs flour, 40 lbs bacon, 5 lbs coffee, 1 1/2 lbs tea and 14 lbs sugar.

From District No. 4.—Sixteen families embracing between 50 and 60 persons were relieved with 215 bushels coal, 375 lbs flour, 70 lbs bacon, 17 papers coffee, 6 papers tea and 60 lbs sugar.

From District No. 5.—Five families were relieved with 75 bushels coal, 40 lbs flour, 2 1/2 lbs bacon, 1 lb coffee and 13 lbs sugar.

From District No. 6.—Three families were relieved with 75 bushels coal, 60 lbs flour, 30 lbs bacon, 9 lbs coffee, 12 lbs sugar and 1 paper tea.

This making an aggregate of—families relieved, and the Managers report having received great assistance from the ladies of their several districts in looking up and reporting the needy cases. Your Ex-Board have made a small commencement during the past year, in trying to accomplish the objects of the Association, and they assure you a wide field is open in Cumberland this present winter for devotedly earnest efforts for the relief of the poor in our midst.

Should poverty or distress ever visit any of you, your journey through this vale of tears, where fortune is so varying and so fickle, may kind friends minister to your wants and mercifully relieve you in the hour of distress and gloom.

All of which is respectfully submitted by the Executive Board of the "Association for the Relief of the Poor of Cumberland."
