EXPLANATORY.

Card From the Officers of the Rushville Presbyterian Church.

Rushville, Feb. 4.—We, the stated supply and officers of the Presbyterian Church in Rushville, assembled to take action concerning a publication in the Indianapolis Sentinel of Saturday, January 24, 1885, in which it is stated that Rev. James D. Thomas was dismissed from the charge of this church, under the head of "Democratic Divine Dismissed," and that the reason or ground of that so-called dismissal was political.

1. We jointly assert that said action was taken in compliance with a request from Rev. J. D. Thomas, and was not a dismissal, but simply an expression of the opinion of the officers of the church upon questions touching the interests of Rev. J. D. Thomas and the church.

2. We further assert that this action was of a private character and intended only to be conveyed to Rev. J. D. Thomas as a matter of opinion and advice on subjects on which he had sought said advice, and that it was not based upon political grounds.

We deem the publication of this card simple justice to both parties. Neither Rev. J. D. Thomas nor the officers of this church desire to have the private matters affecting his interests discussed in the public press, and particularly do we deem it harmful to him as a minister of the Gospel to be published as in any sense allied to politics, thereby causing his dismissal from church relations, and harmful to the church to publish it as so allied to any political interest or opinion as to cause the church to dismiss a minister upon such grounds.
