LEGISLATIVE NOTES.

A Bill to Protect Employes of Street Car Companies. A Resolution Regarding the Education of the Indians—Other Notes.

The Appellate Court bill will come up as the special order at 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon. Speaker Jewett has decided that members hereafter can obtain leave of absence only by a majority vote.

The House Saturday morning refused to make the Metropolitan Police bill the special order for to-morrow evening.

The Governor has signed the bill providing for a temporary loan of \$900,000 and for funding the outstanding loan at a lower rate of interest.

Representative Haworth has introduced a bill to amend the liquor law, providing that license to sell liquors should not be granted by a County Board to any person not a resident of the county.

The bill to compel railroad companies to fence their tracks where they extend through improved lands was ordered engrossed in the House Saturday.

Representative Helms has introduced a bill, making it unlawful to compel any driver or other employe of a street car company to labor more than twelve hours out of twenty-four, and providing a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50 for every violation of the same.

Mr. Williams has introduced a bill authorizing the Trustees of the Insane Hospital to connect that institution with the city Water Works, so as to afford better fire protection.

It was stated in these columns the other day that Hon. Hugh McCullum had under consideration the expediency of being a candidate for Secretary of State.

Senator Addison introduced the following resolution Saturday: Whereas, believing that the education of Indians and their voluntary citizenship in the United States will most justly, quickly, and economically solve the Indian problem...

That the unpaid sum pledged for educational purposes by the Government as part payment for the cession of lands by Indians, be appropriated for the purpose of stock farming, including tools, etc., for Indian manual-labor schools.

That so much of the net proceeds of the sale of Indian lands as may be necessary shall be set apart for the purpose of creating a permanent fund for the education of Indians.

That the legal personality of all Indians may be granted, and that protection of law may be given them, as it is to all other races within these United States.

That the civilization of Indians may be hastened by providing for and rewarding their civilized industries.

That the salaries of Indian Agents be increased sufficiently to secure good men of large capacity and business experience, and to retain them in service.

Notwithstanding the dull times the Directors of both the American railroads in Mexico are in a hopeful frame of mind. The floating debt of the Mexican Central Company is about funded, and the outlook for net traffic earnings during the coming year is considered very good.

The New York Railroad Commissioners are investigating complaints of discomfort from the overheating and ill-ventilation of cars. The pipes under the seats are objected to, and the Commissioners have inquired why it is not feasible and better to locate the pipes at the center of the floor.

To-day the railroads are moving more than 15,000,000 tons of farm products from the Far West to markets in the Eastern States. At ten cents per 100 pounds, or \$4 a ton, from Chicago to New York, the cost is \$60,000,000.
