CITY IN BRIEF.

The cold wave flag was ordered down at 5 o'clock last night.

The suit of J. M. Nash vs. J. M. Mitchell is on trial in the Federal Court before a jury. It is a suit on account.

Hon. William Parsons will lecture to-night at Plymouth Church under the auspices of the Indianapolis Lecture Course.

A new ice company has been formed, and the promise is made that a coolness will exist between the new and the old ones as a result of a substantial reduction in prices.

Joshua T. Roseberry, the Lafayette forger, who was returned here from Chicago on Monday night, waived preliminary examination yesterday and was sent to jail in default of \$3,000 bonds.

The State Educational Department has just received information that Judge Allison, of the Circuit Court of Switzerland County, has decided that the law authorizing the local tuition tax is unconstitutional. The case will be appealed to the Supreme Court at once.

Yesterday morning Mr. Robert McKnight, a well known and highly respected young man of Plainfield, was thrown from a wagon and his collar-bone broken, besides his head being badly bruised. Mr. McKnight is a brother-in-law of P. W. Morgan, of the Sentinel book and job department.

Arthur L. Bine and B. F. Gardner are on trial in the Federal Court before Judge Blodgett on a charge of using the mails for the purpose of swindling. The particular offense is the sending out of circulars asking Postmasters to become agents for a combined barometer and thermometer, and failing to send the instruments after the money had been remitted for them. About thirty Post-

masters from this and adjoining States were in attendance as witnesses.

Gentlemen on Their Muscle.

There was a slight unpleasantness last evening about 10 o'clock at the Bates House between Hon. John Ferriter and Jesse Johnson, which caused some excitement. Mr. Ferriter was standing in the corridors, and Johnson, who was near him, began a conversation, the subject of which was Joe Fanning, Johnson taking occasion to make some reflections on Fanning. Mr. Ferriter remarked that he was Fanning's friend, and that he would not only not hear him abused but would defend him against attack. Johnson again reflected upon Fanning and his protectors, and struck at Ferriter, who warded off his blow and moved off. Johnson followed him and struck at him again, and again his blow was parried, but this time Mr. Ferriter turned and struck him two heavy blows, knocking him backward several feet and throwing him heavily to the floor. Johnson was badly cut over the right eye and received other bruises. He was picked up in an insensible condition, and taken to his home in a hack, consciousness returning upon his arrival home. He had been drinking freely, and some time before the collision with Ferriter he was ejected from the Museum for drunkenness and disorderly conduct.
