CITY IN BRIEF.

The National Association of Mexican Veterans has been invited to hold its annual meeting in this city during the State Fair week.

Frederick McGahan has filed suit in the Federal Court against Gilbert Warren, for alleged infringement of patent. Both parties reside in this county.

George Reed, a tramp, was defendant in the City Court yesterday. He claimed to be an ex-teacher of French and Latin, and speaks several languages fluently.

Mrs. E. A. Ferry has donated to the Union Fair of the Sisters of Charity a handsome hand painted shovel. It is now on exhibition in the show window of L. S. Ayres & Co.

The Methodist ministers at their meeting yesterday considered the subject of "Communism in the Christian Church," and nearly all the members participated in the discussion.

Washington Lodge, Knights of Honor, will give a complimentary entertainment on Wednesday evening, at Pafflin's Music Hall. A fine programme has been arranged, and all are invited.

The city yesterday drew from the State Treasury \$3,184.69, being that part of the tax paid by the city in building the Refractory sewer and refunded by act of the last Legislature.

It was not the Indianapolis Ice Company that bought the horse from Horace Woods and then stopped payment of check after the horse had died. It was the new Independent Ice Company.

The Superintendent of the American Express Company exonerates the employees who handled the express package which was found to contain paper instead of \$1,000, from all blame in the matter.

Robert S. Roeschlaub, an architect of Denver, Colo., was in the city yesterday inspecting the plans and work on the new State House. An appropriation has been made for building a capitol at Denver.

George Fisher, of Franklin, was arrested and brought to the city yesterday by the

United States authorities, charged with passing a counterfeit \$10 bill at Morgantown. He was held to answer to the Grand Jury.

Morgan's drug store on East Washington street was broken into last night. Two boxes of cigars were taken.

Dr. Edwins is in the city, attending the committee on medical ethics, of which he is a member. The committee has before it the case of Dr. Lomax vs. Dr. Hess, of Grant County.

Sergeant Quigley has a fine meerschman pipe in his possession which was taken from one of the crooks recently captured. The owner is requested to call and identify his property.

Washington Lodge No. 114, Knights of Honor, will give a free entertainment at Pafflin's Hall on Wednesday night, May 13, celebrating their tenth anniversary. A fine programme has been arranged.

Governor Gray left yesterday for Logansport, where the Board of Commissioners of the new Insane Hospitals will meet to-day and inspect the work on the new building. The Governor will be absent till Thursday.

The German Socialists of this city have formed a singing society and will give a concert Sunday evening, the first of a series. They will also give a picnic July 4. The proceeds to go to France to assist the Socialists there on election day.

It is reported that Andrew Wood, the merchant policeman who left his wife two weeks ago, taking with him all her available cash, returned to the city quietly yesterday, watched his opportunity, and took his child away from home. He has not been seen since, and it is presumed he has left for good.

Hon. Le Roy D. Brown, State Superintendent of Public Instruction in Ohio, has written State Superintendent Holcombe a complimentary letter regarding the Indiana educational exhibit at New Orleans. In it he says: "Your educational exhibit is a fine one in many respects. I doubt if Indiana ever before equalled it. Your work on country schools is exceptionally good, and shows what efficient county supervision can do for the schools of rural districts. Ohio and other States without supervision need it badly, and some States with county supervision need improvement in that line of work."

Miss Smiley's Readings.

Miss Sarah Smiley, the Bible reader, was listened to by a fair audience at Christ Church last evening, her subject being the "Sonship." She read a number of passages from the Bible referring to the Savior as the son of God and at the same time the son of man, and deduced some valuable instruction from the passages, referring to the mystery connected therewith, in a human sense, and dwelling at length on the unsearchable richness of the grace which makes the Christian an heir of God and joint heir with His Son. Miss Smiley is a very impressive speaker, and her references and conclusions proved that she was a very industrious Bible student.
