K. P. Work at Danville.  
Grand Instructor Heiskell and several other officers went to Danville, Ind., Monday evening, on an invitation from Danville Lodge No. 48, and conferred the three different ranks on twelve candidates. Murder Case Reversed.  
Judge Hawk, of the Supreme bench, yesterday delivered an opinion in the Warner murder case, reversing the decision and remanding it for another trial. The court below sentenced Warner to death on his plea of guilty, without a trial by jury. The opinion is based on Section 13 of the State Constitution, which says: "In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have the right to public trial by an impartial jury," etc., and the Court adds, "This right is his personal and constitutional right, which he can not be deprived of, nor can he waive it, unless such waiver is expressly authorized by statute. This case is a capital case, and, in such, there not only is no statutory authority for the defendant's waiver of his right to a trial by jury, but the statute declares that the trial thereof must be by jury."

ENAL BRITH.  
Annual Meeting of the District Lodge in This City—Addresses and Reports.

The District Grand Lodge No. 2, Independent Order of Enal Brith (Sons of Covenant), began its annual session yesterday morning in this city. The session will continue to Thursday night. The following officers were present at the opening of the Lodge: President—Henry Mack, of Cincinnati. Vice President—Jacob Firth, of St. Louis. Treasurer—Maurice Bauer, of Cincinnati. Secretary—A. Abraham, of Cincinnati. Sergeant at Arms—C. B. Feibleman, of Indianapolis.  
Sixty-five delegates, from Ohio, Illinois, Kentucky and this State were present. The Lodge being opened formally the President read his address. This was an interesting paper and showed that during the year the membership had decreased fifty-two, leaving the present number 3,332, and the treasury had suffered a depletion of \$2,812.21, leaving an aggregate of \$122,761.93. The installations during the year were 72 against 172 the preceding year, and the withdrawals and suspensions 126 against 68 last year. One cause for this decrease lay in the abolishment of all investments in the ritual, the simplicity of the address was of matters pertinent to the inner working of the Order, and complimentary to the management of the Cleveland Orphan Asylum, the aggregate of the eleventh annual report of I. K. Perkins, as Secretary of the endowment fund. Enrolled members December 31, 1884, 3,070; deaths during the year, thirty-seven; withdrawals, 62; suspensions, 65, and expulsions, 2. Receipts from all sources, including \$51,405 assessments, \$81,439.85; expenditures, including \$34,900 benefits paid and \$37,274.38 investment, \$74,526.68; cash on hand, \$7,113.15. The total receipts since the establishment of the fund are \$476,739.85, and the disbursements \$469,626.70. Of the latter \$202,000 was endowments paid to heirs of deceased members, and \$19,932.12 for current expenses. The decrease in membership during the past year was 48. The report of the Trustees also included a number of valuable suggestions, as well as the statement of the Treasurer, Louis S. Levi, all of which were appropriately referred to.  
In the afternoon the Standing Committees were appointed, and at night a musical and literary entertainment was given the delegates and visitors by the Phoenix Literary Society of Maennerchor Hall, in which M. Bamberger, Perry Ingalls, Mrs. Frank H. Levering, M. E. Spades, Miss Lulu Bari, Miss Jennie Applegate, Miss Florence Bamberger, Miss Lottie Adams, Miss Ray Salomon, and Professor Mueller's orchestra took part. There will be a ball and banquet to-night at English's.
