The trial of the prisoners indicted by the Federal Court Grand Jury will begin on Monday.

Rev. George Booth will address the Gospel temperance meeting in Military Park at 4 o'clock to-morrow afternoon.

Edward Kavanaugh was seriously injured by the falling of a casting at Sinker & Davis' foundry day before yesterday.

Marion Castle, No. 160 K. G. R., meets at their hall every Monday evening at 8 o'clock, instead of Thursday as heretofore.

Doc Wilson has filed a complaint against Ernest Knodle under the civil rights law because he was refused the privilege of playing pool in Knodle's saloon.

J. W. Mellish, of this city, has been given ten days in jail on plea of guilty, in the Federal Court, of passing a counterfeit dollar. He has been five months in jail awaiting trial.

Horace Wood yesterday recovered \$175 before a jury in the Squire's Court, the value of a horse sold to the Independent Ice Company, and which dropped dead a few days after the sale.

While cleaning a vault in the rear of 191 East Washington street yesterday, a quantity of counterfeiters' tools and some spurious nickels were found by the workmen. It is supposed the tools were thrown into the vault by Caylor, who was sent up sometime ago for passing counterfeit nickels.
