

THE GROGAN AFFAIR.—We find in the Montpelier Watchman the correspondence between Governor Jenison, of Vermont, and Sir Richard Jackson, acting Governor of Canada, on the subject of the arrest of James W. Grogan, Governor Jenison wrote on the 29th of September, briefly describing the outrage, and requesting immediate investigation and the release of Grogan. Sir Richard Jackson wrote in reply on the 6th of October, at Kingston, that immediately on receiving intelligence of the transaction, and before receiving the letter of Governor Jenison, he had directed the matter to be investigated, with orders for the immediate release of Grogan if it should appear that he had been seized within the United States. On the same day Sir Richard wrote again, and his second letter we give entire:

Baltimore Sun.
GOVERNMENT HOUSE, KINGSTON,
 6th October, 1841.
 Sir—Since I addressed to your Excellency my despatch of this morning, I have received from the law officer of the crown at Montreal a report, from which it appears that the evidence which they had obtained on the subject proved that Grogan's arrest took place, as was alleged, within the territory of the United States. In conformity, therefore, with their instructions they had taken steps for setting Grogan at liberty, and conveying him to the frontier in the neighborhood of which he was arrested. I am informed that Grogan left Montreal accordingly on the 4th inst.

I beg to assure your Excellency that I shall nevertheless continue the investigation which I have directed, and if the information conveyed to your Excellency that officers or soldiers in her majesty's service were implicated in this affair, should prove correct, I shall not fail to visit the offence with the utmost rigor.

EAST FLORIDA, Oct. 20, 1841.
 DEAR SIR:—The glad tidings have come to hand that Tiger Tail's brother E-noc-tho-la-math-la, has come into Tampa Bay, and reports Tiger Tail is on his way in, with the most of his people or band.—Should he come in, and there cannot now be a possibility of a doubt, but he will, it will be glorious indeed, for the settlements will be immediately relieved from these infernal savages, and it will narrow down the line of operation, to but a short space comparatively,—the Everglades.

Six Companies of Dragoons are to leave Florida for Fort Jesup and Towson, on the Arkansas Frontier.—Their move will be immediately. A Company of the 2nd Infantry relieves the Company of Dragoons at Trader's Hill; another Company of the same Regiment, relieves the Company of Dragoons stationed at Fort Moina.

The Norfolk Beacon of yesterday says: The U. S. steamer Poinsett, Lt. Comdr. G. Glisson, with the President of the United States on board, arrived at the Grove, at half past one on Monday last. The gentlemen who accompanied him proceeded to Williamsburg with him. We understand that a Ball in honor of the President was to be given by the citizens of Williamsburg on Monday night.—Balt. Pat.

Snow.—The Wheeling Gazette of Monday morning states there have been heavy falls of snow in the mountains, so as to cause a detention of the mails.

The U. S. ship of the line Delaware, was expected to sail from Hampton Roads, on Tuesday, for the Brazilian station.

It is said that there is to be an armed steamer built for the Lakes. If war is to be provided for, surely the lakes must claim an early attention. Erie, of course, comes in for building the vessel. That is the port, we believe, best calculated for such a work.—Del. Rep.

The Legislature of New Jersey were to meet on Wednesday. A Governor and other State officers are to be chosen at this session.

The Hotel keepers in Boston are tickling the palates of the gourmands of that city, by serving up some of the real English South Down mutton, received by the steamer Columbia. By the same arrival they have also a supply of English turbot.

During the third week in October the quantity of flour delivered from the Erie Canal at Albany and Troy, was 62,740 bushels, and of wheat 47,608 bushels.

In Ohio the Locos have a majority of 2 in each branch of the Legislature.


