From the New England Farmer. LIME AND SALT AS FERTILIZERS Mr. Editor:—Having been induced by a statement made by Professor Mapes of New Jersey, in relation to the value of Shell Lime mixed with salt as a manure to try an experiment to test its value, and the result corroborating, not only his statement, but upon examination of Dr. Dana's Muck Manual, since the result, I find that he strongly recommends the use of lime and salt as a valuable manure mixed with meadow mud or peat.

The farm which I occupy is near the common in Lexington, and the meadow is on the Bedford road; average depth of peat, about six feet. This is the second year that it has been cultivated since it was in grass, and one part, about a quarter of an acre, was planted with potatoes, in drills, and manured with common barn-yard manure. The other part was planted in hills with not more than half the quantity of manure from the same heap, (seed the same in both instances,) and contained about one-eighth of an acre, but the last had four barrels of shell lime and one bushel of salt dissolved and thrown on to slack it. After carefully measuring two rods of the land where the salt and lime were used, and digging the potatoes, the product was 5 bushels and 1 peck. The same quantity was measured, on which the potatoes were planted with the barn-yard manure only—the result was a fraction less than 2 bushels. Cost of 4 barrels of shell lime, 42 cts. per barrel, \$1.70; less value of barrels at 10 cts. each, 40 cts.; cost of salt 25 cts. per bushel, cost of labor composting 50 cts.; the whole cost \$2.05.—I consider, upon the whole, that the cost of manure in both is the same, and the result would give at the rate of 420 bushels to the acre in one case, and 140 in the other, or in other words at the rate of one hundred and eighty bushels per acre in favor of salt and lime.

HINTS TO FARMERS.—Never feed potatoes to stock without boiling or steaming them, as this increases their nutritive qualities.

Never burn all dry wood in your fire-places nor even use a fire-place when you can get a stove.

Put your trees for rails in February, they are most durable.

Never select your seed from the crib, but from the stalk.

SEED AS FAST AS YOU PLOW.—This is much neglected, much to the loss of the farmer. It is a common practice to plow land weeks before it is seeded. This gives an advantage to the seed of weeds in the soil to get a fine start. The moisture and mellowness of the earth when first turned causes seed put in then to vegetate immediately. How much better it would be that the grain should have this advantage than the weeds.

The following report was handed to the Principal by the committee on the best examination. The committee was composed of Rev. J. Squier, of Port Deposit, Md.; Rev. S. M. Omond, of Oxford, Pa.; and S. J. Dirkey, Esq., of Hopewell.

By invitation of Mr. James T. Doran, A. M., Principal of the Hopewell Classical and Mercantile School, the undersigned, as a committee, attended and conducted the public examination of its pupils, which took place at the close of the present session, Sep. 27th, 1852.

The time allowed for the examination was sufficiently prolonged to be perfectly satisfactory. The different branches of study, upon which the pupils were examined, were such as are usually pursued at schools of the same standing, embracing those of a liberal education, as well as the more advanced subjects, connected with the natural sciences, Mathematics, and Languages. The examination was thorough and searching. The Principal urged us to make it such, and as far as our ability extended, we did so. The classes were given up entirely to our disposal, and could possibly know nothing of the portions, upon which they were to be examined, or the questions which were to be asked.

We endeavored to test the knowledge of the pupils more as to ideas and ideas, than mere words—to learn whether judgment, as well as memory, was receiving its adequate cultivation. Sometimes the text book was rigidly followed, but more frequently independent questions were asked, for the purpose of discovering whether an ability had been acquired for a practical application of the principles mastered. In justice to both teachers and pupils, we feel bound to say that the examination was *ably executed*. There was an appearance of confidence in the pupils—a promptness and clearness in answering the questions put to them, which we were assured could result only from thorough preparation—preparation too, of the right kind,—not mere cramming for the occasion, or a drilling on particular points for the purpose of doing well on examination day,—but such as faithful discipline and honest, diligent application can alone give.

From the faithfulness evinced on this occasion by the principal, and the diligence and progress of the pupils, we take pleasure in recommending this Institution to the patronage of the community, feeling confident that all those commending their sons or wards to his care, will be amply rewarded by their moral and intellectual advancement.
