THE NEW ROAD LAW.

SWORNING IN THE NEW COMMISSIONERS—Sale of the Roads.

The County Commissioners were in session on Tuesday and fixed upon the date for the sale of the roads.

At Fair Hill on April 14th at Calvert, on the 15th; at Rising Sun, on the 16th; at Mr. Pleasant, on the 17th; at Port Deposit, on the 18th; at North East, on the 19th; at Cecil, on the 21st; at Chesapeake City, on the 22nd; and at Elkton on the 23rd.

As a condition of road must be purchased by a resident of the district in which it is located. The Commissioners hope to secure as purchasers, the farmers of the various neighborhoods, whose properties are adjacent to the roads sold, and who have a personal interest in the roads.

The work of the Commissioners, John S. Russell began sweating in the recently appointed road commissioners, yesterday morning, when Messrs. Jefferson W. Palmer, John T.
