Four hundred and twenty-four years ago, at 2 o'clock on the morning of October 12, Christopher Colon, or as we Americans call him, Christopher Columbus, caught his first glimpse of the Western continent, from the high forecastle of his flagship, the Santa Maria.

Mrs. Sophia Peters, colored, died suddenly Friday of last week at her home near Rising Sun, from heart trouble. The funeral was held Monday with interment at Mt. Zoar.

Conference On 8 Hour Day For Women

In co-operation with the National Consumers' League, the Consumers' League of Delaware will hold a regional conference on the eight hours day for women in Wilmington, on October 17, 1916. The Delaware League is inviting interested people from the District of Columbia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware and New York.

Similar regional conferences on the eight hours day for women will be held during the fall in New England and in Chicago, members of the Consumers' League and the Women's Trade Union League being invited to Springfield from all the New England States, and to Chicago from Missouri, Kentucky, Indiana and Wisconsin—where there are Consumers' Leagues, and from Michigan and Iowa—where we have contributors and sympathizers, though no Leagues.

The object is to bring to the attention of intelligent people in all States the fact that the Supreme Court of the United States has sustained the eight hours law of California, and that five States only in the whole country have failed themselves of the permission thus granted to establish a shorter working day throughout the nation.
