

News In Brief

Oxfordians were greatly shocked on Monday of last week to learn of the unconfirmed despatch that Miss Jenn Hosie, daughter of Mrs. Samuel B. Price, of Scranton, and grand-daughter of Mrs. Jennie R. Dickey, Oxford, had died of pneumonia in Liverpool, England, where she had gone to do canteen work for the Y. W. C. A. The report cannot be definitely authenticated, but as Miss Hosie is known to have been ill with pneumonia, it is feared that it is correct. Miss Hosie spent several weeks during each year at the Dickey home on Market street, and is well known to Oxfordians.

Miss Edna Pugh, aged, went on Monday of last week to Washington, D. C., to teach Reorganization Aid to soldiers in the Walter Reed Hospital. She lately received a course of training, embracing some months, in Baltimore, and is greatly attached to the work. Miss Pugh is the daughter of Mrs. Clara L. Pugh Peon avenue.

Clarence Edens, an employe of the fishing firm of Prettyman & Phide, of Lewes, while near the fishing grounds of the company, a short distance from the mouth of the Broadkin, captured a black otter which measured five and one-half feet in length. The otter was spied flouncing in the water as the boat passed it and was hit with an oar. When carried to the shore a trap was found fastened to one of the front feet. The animal was skinned and the fur sold to William Lolland, of Lewes, for \$20. Samuel C. Prettyman, senior member of the firm of Prettyman & Phide, who has been engaged in fishing in the waters of the Broadkin River, Rehoboth Bay, Lewes Creek and the Delaware Bay for the past 49 years, states that this is the first otter ever captured in that section of the State.

An automobile valued at \$6000, belonging to O. M. Wortman, of New York, was destroyed by fire near Churchville. The owner is of the belief that sparks from a hot brake spread to the gasoline tank.

Letter from Harlan G. Rose

Germany, February 9, 1919. Dear Mother:— Your letter written January 12th arrived yesterday afternoon.

For some reason you have not received my letters and postcards that I sent from Bacharach Dec. 11. This was the first mail I sent you during our march. We are still at Ochendung. We have about completed a horse dip close to the town of Mayen for some veterinarian outfit. It was pretty hard work, too. Most of the ground was slate and we had to put in a pine line 12 feet deep, went over and came back in trucks. I am sending you some pictures taken in Mayen. You have been asking for them; they are a sample of German work.

I will have to say something about the way we are treated here by the people. To start off with, they made me a nice bed, after I told them the mattress was pretty hard. Potatoes seem to be plentiful, and they are as free with them as water, so I am not going hungry. The lady of the house

makes us cakes and gives us marmalade. They call it jam. The cakes are not like ours, but they taste awfully good, just the same.

Every Friday we have a smoker in a large cafe at the station, that includes beer, cigarettes, or lemonade and some of the company talent to furnish amusements. On Saturday nights we have boxing and wrestling, which some of the other outfits of the Division at the Y. M. C. A.

I was granted my pass last Friday to take a ride on the boat up the Rhine. We went up to Bonn. The scenery was beautiful, but it was too cold to enjoy it.

Uncle Sam has taken over most of the boats and it did look good to see Old Glory going up and down the Rhine. There is an order out now that makes us carry our rifles wherever we go. It is safety first here at all times. The guard has been doubled, too. We are having very cold weather here now. It was 10 below zero yesterday. I am still troubled with my cold; outside of that, I am feeling fine. We have finished our pass haul, and started out this morning with hot cakes, syrup, rice and coffee. Our kitchen was the only one to survive the war.

It was worn so much that the only thing we could cook was coffee, so we ate a new one now.

We are having a memorial service this morning. I will tell you about it later. I am trying to get a pass to London, so am putting my money away for that. I received a card from Ralph Dean in France, saying he was on a seven day furlough to Aix-les-Bains.

I will close with love to all.
