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COMMERCIAL RECORD. PHILADELPHIA MARKET, June 9, 1840.

MONEY.—In mercantile circles light, without any demand in the street; the banks readily answering all applications of good and regular business paper; stocks, nevertheless, remain very quiet. United States Bank Stock has again receded to 67. Philadelphia, Wilmington, and Baltimore R. R. Co., however, fully holds its own; nor is it likely there will be the Legislature device some efficient means of paying the interest on the debt, and thus giving confidence to the holders, both in this country and Europe. The Tax Bill, which passed the House eight or ten days since, slumbers in the Senate; and two steamers have recently left our shores for England, without carrying out our foreign creditors any assurance that interest on the State loans will be punctually paid in specie or its equivalent. The Legislature in mercantile transactions there has been little doing the last two days; there are few vessels in port, and our wharves present rather a naked appearance; there are no freights now offering for Europe, and vessels proceed South, which is better demand; last dates from New Orleans 14 1/2-16 was the current freight to Liverpool.

NEW YORK MARKET. June 10.

There was very little doing in foreign exchange. The packet ship Iowa, which sailed for Havre, took out \$30,000 in specie. Bills on Philadelphia sold at 4 1/2 a 4 3/4 per cent. discount. In uncurrent money no material change is manifested. The sales at the stock exchange were moderate, at a further decline in prices. North American Trust & Bank declined 1 per cent. United States Bank 1 per cent. Canton Co. 2 1/2 per cent. Harlem 4 per cent. Stocks of all kinds thus continue to depreciate.
