Dear Sir:—The general election for state officers in Alabama took place on Monday last, and I have heard from five counties, in all of which the Whig ticket triumphed throughout, the Whig majority in Dixon H. Lewis's own county, was 240 votes. Alabama will give Gen. Harrison a large majority.

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AMERICAN COTTON GOODS.

The demand has been quite limited more so than during the preceding week. There has, however, been no decline in price. Holders are asking the same as last week—the quotations of which we continue.

CATTLE.

There were offered on Monday about 450 head, and 250 were sold at from \$6 to \$6.50, a few prime brought \$7. There were several dozen sent on to the cities east of us.

COFFEE.

The cargoes of the barque Leda and the brig Fabius, were offered yesterday at auction, but the bidding being rather flat they were withdrawn; a party only being taken. About 2,600 bags of the above cargoes were afterwards taken at private sale at 9 1/2 a 11.

FLOUR.

Howard Street still continues dull and the receipts light. We have heard of several sales being made during the week of small lots at \$5.25, made from new wheat. We quote the asking price from stores to-day at \$5.25. The receipt price remains at \$5.00. Susquehanna—sales have been made within the last two days at \$5.25; but little in market. Sales of City Mills fresh ground at \$5.50.

We note sales of Potomac at \$7.50, and North Carolina at \$8.25. CODFISH.—Sales at \$2.35, dull. MACKEREL.—We hear of no transactions in No. 1 or 2 Mackerel, the stock on hand is limited. We quote No. 1 at \$1.30, and No. 2 at \$1.10, No. 3 \$0.95.

GRAIN.

Sales of red wheat at \$1.08 a \$1.13, and of white wheat at \$1.15 a \$1.18. Corn—sales of yellow at 50 a 51, and of white at 48 cents. Sales of Maryland Oats at 25 cents; and of Maryland Rye at 35 cents.

INDIGO.

We note sales during the week of 6 c c rous Caracas F at \$1.35; We quote F at \$1.30. MOLASSES.—75 hds and 14 tierces Porto Rico Molasses were offered at auction yesterday and sold as follows: hds 30 a 31; tierces 32 cents per gal. At private sale a lot of Cuba, in hds, was taken at 35 cents per gal.

OILS.

We note sales, to a limited extent, at the following rates, viz: Winter \$1.15; Fall \$1.10, and Whale 34 cents per barrel.

PROVISIONS.

We hear of no transactions of moment and prices remain without change. Mess pork is held at \$16 a \$17; prime at \$14.50; mess beef at 15; No. 1 at \$13 a \$13.50, and prime at 11. Strictly prime assayed bacon at \$1 to \$1. There has been several transactions in Lard at 11 1/2 a 12 cents; Baltimore Hams 12 a 13. The inspections of the week are 7 bbls Beef.

PLASTER.

There have been several arrivals and the price has declined a shade. We note sales during the week of 3 cargoes at \$2.25. RICE.—We note sales of Savannah, in tierces, at \$3.75 a \$4 per 100 lbs.

SUGAR.

There was offered at auction yesterday the cargo of the brig Water Witch, consisting in part of 250 hds and 8 bbls Porto Rico sugar. 125 hds were sold \$7.15 a \$8.40. The balance of the hds were withdrawn. The 8 bbls brought \$7.15.

TOBACCO.

There has been a fair demand, and the sales have kept up with the receipts. Maryland was sold freely at former quotations. In the early part of the week there was but little demand for Ohio, but within the last 2 days it has went off quite brisk. We continue to quote; viz: Common to good \$3.80, \$4.50, middling to good \$5.00; good \$6.50, and fine \$8.13. The inspections of the week comprise 661 hds Maryland, 284 hds Ohio, and 3 hds Kentucky.

WHISKEY.

Continues to be in demand and there has been an advance in prices. We quote hds at 27 a 28, and bbls 29 a 30. The wagon price is 22 cents exclusive of the bbl.

WAGON FREIGHTS.

There has been no variation in the prices charged for transporting goods by way of wagons to Wheeling and Pittsburg. We quote \$1.25 to Wheeling, and 87 cents per 100 lbs. to Pittsburg. Transportation to Pittsburg by the Tide Water Canal and Susquehanna Rail Road line, are \$1.25 per 100 lbs. for dry goods, &c.; groceries 75 cents per 100 lbs. and fish \$1.50 a 1.75 per bbl.
