NEW YORK. The New York Times expresses the opinion, that the banks of Boston and that city, are not in a condition to render assistance by way of loan to the Banks of Philadelphia.

PENNSYLVANIA. BEAUTIFUL.—The Portico of St. Luke's Church, in Thirteenth street below Spruce, attracts general remark from all who have seen it. It is truly beautiful; for while it is the most ornate order of architecture (a rich composite) it is chastened by the sombre color of the front. The Portico is supported by ten pillars. It will repay the walk to look upon it.

NEW COUNTERFEIT 10s.—Richard's Reporter states that a new counterfeit on the Bank of the Northern Liberties, of the denomination of ten dollars, has made its appearance. The bill is printed with pale ink, of a yellow tinge, paper light; the genuine bills are printed with clear black ink. The following is a description of the spurious bills—Letter A. payable to S. Starr, dated 4 July, 1853; R. L. Pitfield, Cash'r., J. Knight, Pres't. Signatures pretty well executed. Any person at all conversant with the notes of this Bank will readily detect the counterfeit.—Look out for them.

GEORGIA. At the recent election in Georgia, it was decided by a vote of the people that the Legislature of the State shall hereafter meet once in two years. The majority in favor of biennial sessions is over 30,000.

MICHIGAN. METHODISTS IN MICHIGAN.—The number of members in the Methodist Church in Michigan is 11,408, viz, 11,300 white members, 12 colored and 87 Indians. The number of Ministers 73, and local preachers 116.

MEXICO. YUCATAN.—The following extract of a letter dated Carmen Laguna de Terminos Mexico, Oct. 1. "We find in the Phil. Inquirer: "We are entirely separated from the Mexican Government, (this State of Yucatan) and carrying on hostilities in the next State of Tabasco—war to the knife!

"Should Mexico not admit the federal form of government, we are to do the same as Texas—form a republic apart. There is not a government soldier in our territory, and our Congress is now seriously legislating upon free immigration of strangers.

"The Texian star is now for the first time floating in a Mexican port—this one. Day before yesterday, the steam ship of War Zavala, of Texas, entered this port, and now lies here equal to the best of friends!"

TRAVELLING IN ENGLAND.—Travellers in the country often complain of the annoyance to which they are subjected from the demand of waiters at taverns, and many from a settled principle of opposition to the establishment of a rule, which, in some countries had grown into extortion on a pretty large scale, refuse to pay, at taverns, any thing more than their regular bills. In England the expense and irritation to which a traveller is exposed from this cause, have become a serious evil. The following extract from the correspondent of the New York American, graphically details the whole process:

"But there is one species of mendacity in England deserving of universal reprobation, to which I cannot but allude. You have just settled your bill at a tolerable hotel, at the rate of five dollars per day, and are rushing through the hall, umbrella in hand, to mount the coach, whose driver is shouting "Time is quite a bup!" You run over the waiter, jostle the chambermaid, tread on the porter, and are brought up all standing by the boots—each looking greedily, and expecting in the aggregate, a sum nearly equal to what would cover your bill at an American hotel. You take your seat in the coachman, who is dressed so finely that you hardly dare speak to him during the ride. Before leaving you, he tips his hat and asks you to remember him to the amount of half a crown—for the privilege of having held his reins at every stopping place on the route. I rode with the dandy driver of the Dover track, who on getting down at Dover, touched his hat to each passenger, and begged for his gratuity with the same abjectness, and pocketed the shillings with as much nonchalance as the king of the beggars aforesaid. This coachman was the best dressed man of the party, resides in an elegantly furnished house, wears the latest fashions, and is worth \$50,000. The guard too—he must not be forgotten. For is he not decked in a scarlet coat, and armed to the teeth to defend Victoria's reticule, and has he not changed his horn in your ears every moment of the last seven hours? Besides the coachman and guard, you establish—a burly, beefed and ale-saturated biped, called a porter. The following dialogue took place recently at Hasings. Scene, top of a coach just leaving town.

Biped—(touching his cap, and looking significantly.) I leaves you here, sir. Rambler—Very well—good-bye. Biped—Please remember the coach porter, sir, what put your honor's luggage on. Rambler—Here it is. Biped—But, sir, I gets my living in this way. Gents always pays a sixpence. Rambler—Here it is. It is no plea in abatement to this fleecing that you paid for your seat at the "booking office," at the rate of ten cents per mile.

PORTUGAL. Lisbon dates, Oct. 12, mention the confinement of the Queen, and alarm for her health. The funeral of the Infanta Donna Maria (the deceased child having been baptized under that name) took place with great pomp at San Vincent de Fora, on the 6th inst., which, according to custom in similar cases, was kept as a gala day. There was a splendid procession of seven royal carriages, some conveying the Patriarch, the Dukes of Palmella and Terceira, the Marquis, and numerous other Princes, and members of the royal household,—one containing the coffin of the deceased infant; and another, the coffin bearer with a golden crown, preceded by a long string of private carriages, which, however, made no very grand appearance, and followed by a large body of troops, consisting of the Lanciers, Horse Artillery, the National Battalion, 21 and 3d Cacadores, 7th and 17th Infantry, and Municipal Guards, horse and foot, nearly 3000 altogether, passed in procession from the Necropolis to San Vincente, thus going through the whole length of the city. Mass was celebrated at San Vincente, at noon, and the ceremony was over by six o'clock, when the troops returned to their quarters.

SPAIN. It was again reported in Paris that the Queen Regent of Spain had arrived at Port Vendre, but nothing certain on the subject was known. The Madrid government had decreed that the individuals driven from their homes by the provisional juntas now residing in the capital, should quit it within a delay of forty-eight hours, and leave the territory of the province of Madrid in the course of four days.
