MASSACHUSETTS ELECTION.

The Boston Atlas of Tuesday says: 'The Freemen of Massachusetts have met the trained bands of the Administration at the polls, and most gloriously have they conquered. They have swept Locoocoism from off the face of the land. They have most fully and triumphantly redeemed the honor of the State, and wiped off from her escutcheon the foul blot, that last year was suffered to rest upon it. BOSTON THE CROWNING CITY.

Every ward in the city of Boston but one has given a majority for Harrison. The Boston Atlas says:

'By the vote for governor it will be seen JOHN DAVIS has a majority of 2807 over Marcus Morton. The Harrison Electoral ticket has outrun the gubernatorial several hundred votes, and the majority for Harrison in the city cannot fall below THREE THOUSAND.'

MIDDLESEX COUNTY REDEEMED!

The entire Senatorial ticket is elected, and all the towns heard from but six, which cannot vary the result. Harrison's majority is nearly 600. Whig gain 2161.

BRISTOL.

Morton's majority is 498. Whig gain 507. HENRY WILLIAMS DEFEATED.

It will be seen that no man Williams has not elected to Congress from the Tenth Congressional district. The majority against him in the district is 69. The Loco Foco Senators are elected by a small majority in Bristol county. These are probably the only Loco Foco Senators who will have the honor of a seat in the next Senate of this State.

SALEM.

Salem has given 865 Whig majority.

LOWELL.

Lowell over 600 Whig majority.

TAUNTON.

Taunton has done nobly. She has given a majority of nine votes against Morton in his own town, and has chosen three Whig Representatives. Well done, Whigs of Taunton!

INDIANA.

TERRE HAUTE, Nov. 3, 1840.

DEAR SIR: As the great contest, which is to confer liberty, or strengthen the chains of Executive irresponsibility or despotism, on the country, for years, terminated, so far as this and twelve other States are concerned, yesterday, I hasten to give you the returns, so far as they have come in. You will see by them that, in every instance, they indicate an accession of strength to the Whig cause; and, I trust, are an index of the important results involved in yesterday's peaceful struggle at the ballot-box. You are as follows:

Vigo county, in a vote of 2,100, a majority not less than 970 for the Whigs.

THE BANK OF KENTUCKY.

A circular has been issued by this institution under date of the 26th ult., giving a statement of its actual condition, and certain explanations in relation to the Levis forgeries of stock. It is stated that about 13,000 shares of spurious stock were issued—147 of which have since been surrendered by the parties with whom they were placed. A process for tracing between the forged and the real stock is now in progress, and the opinion is confidently expressed that "the entire proceeds of the sale of the spurious stock of the Bank of Kentucky, amounting to upwards of \$60,000, were appropriated for the use and benefit of the Schuykill Bank." It is added, that the Schuykill Bank has ample means to refund this money—and to the holders of the spurious stock must look. The state of the Bank may be thus summed up:
