MONDAY, JANUARY 4.

THREE WEEKS LATER FROM BUENOS AYRES AND MONTE VIDEO.

By the brig Rhine, Capt. Hawkins, we have Buenos Ayres papers to Oct. 17th, and Monte Video letters to the 25th, which are here subjoined:

MONTE VIDEO, Oct. 19 1840.

Business here is at a stand, waiting events in Buenos Ayres. Baron Mackau, the French admiral, went up some days since. We hear that he has had a conference with Rosas's minister, which lasted four hours.

The French have a strong force in front of Buenos Ayres. There are also a good many frigates vessels here. Three of their light draught rigs are fitting masts. I think the French will land and take the city.

Official accounts reached here a few days since from Lavalle. He had completely defeated Lopez de Santa Fe, and taken possession of the province. He would again shortly take up his march for Buenos Ayres.

There is no doubt that he will "use up" the monster. The assassinations, executions, robberies, and snail committed and committing in Buenos Ayres by order of Rosas, are truly horrible and revolting to humanity.

So many as 15 have been assassinated, by having their throats cut and being shot, in Rosas's encampment, in one day. You can form no idea of the present state of Buenos Ayres. All that can get away are leaving. I understand that natives of Buenos Ayres have been refused passports.

Rosas has a decree confiscating all the property of Unitarians. You can have but a faint idea of the monster, and of the crime that he is committing. There are now 45 millions of paper in circulation. Dollars are thirty for one. Exchange on England, 15-8 a third.

All civilized governments should withdraw their representatives. The Brazilian minister, as also the Sardinian, has withdrawn. The latter had a pistol presented to his breast, and was taken to the court, and after being insulted.

October 27th-28 two French steamers have come down with 400 Frenchmen. Negotiations were still going on. It is the general opinion that the admiral is only temporizing to give time for the French subjects to get away.

How can he treat with such a monster? A French subject by the name of Varagout has had his throat cut. The murders, robberies, and in many instances violation of women, still going on.

Lavalle is advancing toward Buenos Ayres with 7 or 8,000 determined men, composed of the flower of the country. I think the chances will be settled in 30 or 40 days. Many old Spaniards have been murdered and robbed of their all.

Others, after being robbed, have escaped by their lives, by secreting themselves. The government paper contains notices of property of Unitarians to be sold at auction. It is really horrible.

MONTEVIDEO, Oct. 25, 1840.

The French admiral proceeded to Buenos Ayres on the 10th inst., and after some correspondence had passed between him and the Government, Don Felipe Arana, the Minister for Foreign Affairs, paid him a visit on board his flag ship, which has been repeated several times since.

Our latest news from Buenos Ayres is to the 24th. Negotiations were going on, but kept perfectly secret, and it is impossible to form an opinion as to the result.

The general impression appears to be, that Governor Rosas will not accede to all that is demanded by the admiral, and unless the latter withdraws some of his demands, particularly such as relate to the revolutionary party (Unitarians), war will be the inevitable consequence.

It is understood that Lavalle, by last accounts, was on his way back, towards Buenos Ayres, and that he had arrived at St. Nicholas, a small town distant about 10 leagues from the city. He had had all the inhabitants to the sword, for having offered resistance.
