ITALY'S AIR FLEET THIRD IN WORLD

Has Big Force of Machines
For Land and Sea Work.

TWO TYPES ARE EMPLOYED

One is Rigid and the Other Semirigid, and Good Results Have Been Obtained From Both—Proved Their Worth During Italo-Turkish War—Machine Girls on Land Squadron.

Rome.—Italy's air force ranks third numerically—right after Germany and France. Two successful types of airships have been evolved—the Brigata Specialisti (nonrigid) and the Forlanini (semirigid) types.

Captain Crocco and Ricaldoni, having achieved fame in aerodynamic research work, were assigned to develop the first Italian military dirigible in 1904. Its trial in 1908 was satisfactory. The type was improved into the P class of Italian dirigibles. The P-1, in 1909, flew from Bracciano to Naples, a three hour trip. The P-2 the next



year flew from Rome to Venice, crossing the Apennines. The construction of a fleet of dirigibles was decided upon in 1911. Three types were constructed—the small type (P class), a medium (M class) and a large (G class), ranging from 2,500 cubic meters capacity to more than 20,000 cubic meters.

When the Italo-Turkish war began several Ps and an M were shipped to Libya. They proved of great value in the military operations in Africa.

Enrico Forlanini's Leonardo da Vinci having proved a successful example of the semirigid airship, the citizens of Milan bought a ship from him and presented it to the government, calling it the Citta di Milano, in 1913. Another Forlanini type has been added to the fleet.

The most recent additions have been a 40,000 cubic meter Brigata Specialisti, called the G-1, and a speedy V-1, built by the same establishment after plans by an aerial engineer named Verduzio. The craft can make ninety kilometers an hour. Eleven dirigible sheds are scattered over Italy.

The Italian aeroplane fleet, which was a factor in the Libya victory, consists of fifteen machines and two sea squadrons, each of ten machines, seven active and three in reserve. The personnel consists of ten pilots, officers and noncommissioned officers and fifty enlisted men (mechanics).

The land squadrons are made up of armed scouts with machine guns and gun spotters. Sixty fast monoplane "spotters" recently were delivered to the army. Many powerful armored "bombardiers" are under construction. The new Caproni bombardier plane is a biplane, armored and carrying a one inch quick fire gun in front. It can make seventy-five miles an hour and can stay aloft twenty-five hours.

Only four types of machines are used in the Italian service, although many older types are used in the aviation schools. The four are the national Caproni, the Savoia-Farman, the St-Bleriot and Nieuport-Macchi.

NEW X RAY SHOWS HAND BEHIND DOOR

Danger of Burning Eliminated
by New Invention.

New York.—After fifteen years of experimentation marked by many reverses and disappointments, Charles H. Stanley, an electrical engineer, announced that he had perfected an X ray device which will mark as great an advance in the science of surgery and therapeutics as the original X ray of Roentgen.

A demonstration of the machine in Stanley's laboratory made it appear that the forecast by Guglielmo Marconi that one would some time be able to look from one room into another through the dividing walls is about to be realized.

Through an ordinary door an inch and an eighth thick and twelve feet from the ray generated by the electrical machine a reporter was able to distinguish clearly the bones of the hand of Stanley moving on the other side, as well as to see the outlines of his hand. This test was made simply to illustrate the immensely greater power of the new machine over the old X ray devices. It is only one of the improvements claimed by Stanley.

The principal value of the discovery lies in the fact that the rays may be applied to patients for extended periods of time without the slightest danger of burns resulting. The danger of burns, often incurable, has been one of the most serious drawbacks to the use of the old X ray and often has offset the advantages accruing.

The Roentgen rays are ordinarily applied only long enough to obtain a picture of the wound, fractured bone, dislocation or diseased portion of the body on which it is proposed to operate. With the new rays a photograph is not necessary, as the rays may be continued an indefinite length of time on the patient, and the surgeon may work directly in the ray.

JESS ORDERS BIG SHOES.

Measurement Shows the Champion Has "Some Feet."

Olathe, Kan.—Jess Willard, the world's champion heavyweight, formerly a cowboy in the west, ordered a pair of "cowboy boots," sending his measurements by mail to a cowboy boot factory here.

The boots are number 10½ of regular boot width, and the calf measurement is twenty inches, the largest by two inches of any of the 130,000 pairs of boots made by this firm, who have been in business here thirty-five years.

Every stitch is hand sewed, and before the pair is completed they will have passed through the hands of sixteen shoemakers, each of whom does one particular part.

\$2,000,000 HOUR WAR'S COST.

Total For First Year Will Be \$174,000,000, Says French Economist.
Paris.—Captain Edmund Thery, widely known as an economist, estimates that the total military expenditures for the first year of the war will be 50,000,000,000 francs (\$10,000,000,000) for the seven allies and 37,000,000,000 francs (\$7,400,000,000) for Germany, Austria and Turkey.
