The County Board of Cook County, Minnesota, met this 1st day of July, 1915, at 10 o'clock A. M. pursuant to call.

Present Commissioners Allen, Bally, Ellquist and Chairman Engelson. Absent Commissioner Jacobson.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and upon motion approved.

The communication of A. V. Johnson asking for clerk hire in the Office of Register of Deeds was received and ordered filed.

It was moved and carried that the County Auditor take necessary steps to see that the furnace be repaired.

It was moved and carried that on account of the high price of feed, the compensation of men and teams employed on state road work be increased from \$5.50 to \$6.40 per day.

The applications of Myrtle Schroeder and Clarence Shultz for abatement of taxes were upon motion rejected.

Applications for reduction of assessment and abatement of taxes for the current year by the following persons: John A. The bill of Kelly How Thompson Co., for tents, etc., was returned for correction.

The following resolution was upon motion adopted:

Resolved, that hereafter in matters pertaining to general care of the court house the janitor act under the direction of the county auditor, and the auditor is hereby authorized to purchase for the use of the janitor material and supplies needed by the janitor for incidental repairs and upkeep of the court house property.

The following resolution was presented: BE IT RESOLVED, That, in the opinion of the Board of County Commissioners of Cook County, Minn., it is expedient to take up and pay the floating indebtedness of said County existing on April 10th, 1915, amounting on that date to the sum of Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-nine and 41/100 dollars, and that it is necessary and expedient to borrow the sum twelve thousand five hundred dollars for that purpose by issuing, negotiating and selling the bonds of said County to said amount; pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 103 General Laws of Minnesota for the year 1915;

The said bonds to be in the sum of five hundred dollars each, be dated August 1st, 1915, and be payable as follows: \$2,500.00 on December 1st, 1916; \$2,500.00 on December 1st, 1917; \$2,500.00 on December 1st, 1918; \$2,500.00 on December 1st, 1919; \$2,500.00 on December 1st, 1920; all of said bonds to be payable in gold coin of the United States of the present standard of weight and fineness at the First National Bank of Duluth, Minn., and to bear interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and that such interest be evidenced on each bond by the required number of interest coupons, the first of said coupons to be for the sum of \$1.00 each and payable on December 1st, 1915; and the remaining interest coupons to be for the sum of \$2.50 each and payable at intervals of six months after December 1st, 1915, the maturity of the bonds to which the same are respectively attached, all of said interest coupons to be payable in like gold coin of the United States.

That the Chairman of this Board and the County Auditor be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to prepare said bonds in the usual form in terms above prescribed. Resolved further that this Board receive bids for the sale of said bonds at the court house in the Village of Grand Marais, said

county, on Monday the 26th day of July, 1915, at ten o'clock A. M., and that due notice of the sale of said bonds be given by the county auditor, clerk of this Board, causing the same to be published once in each week for three successive weeks in the Cook County News-Herald, a newspaper published at Grand Marais, Minnesota, and once in each week for three successive weeks in the Pioneer Press, a newspaper published at St. Paul, Minn., and that said time and place be and are hereby designated as the time and place at which this Board will meet to open and consider bids for the sale of said bonds, and that the notice shall be published;

Resolved further, that said notice shall be in substantially the following form, that is to say:
