**AMERICAN FARMER MUST FEED WORLD**

CONFRONTED WITH SUPPLYING MANY NATIONS WHILE EUROPE IS AT WAR.

**RECORD ACREAGES PLANTED**

Official Estimates by Department of Agriculture Disclose Prospects of Production Exceeding Average of Last Six Years.

Washington, July 10.—American farmers, confronted with feeding the world while Europe is at war, have planted record acreages of all principal crops. Moreover, official estimates just made public by the department of agriculture disclose prospects of production exceeding the average of the last six years in almost every important crop.

**Promise of Records.**

Based on the growing conditions on July 1, some foodstuffs give promise of new records. Their money values promise records accordingly. Corn shows an area of 109,273,000 acres—half a million acres more than ever planted to that crop before—and is expected to produce 2,814,000,000 bushels. Despite wet and cold weather for seven weeks, which has retarded growth and cultivation in the important corn states and forced the condition 2.5 per cent below the ten-year average, the new crop is estimated to be 106,000,000 bushels greater than the last 10 years' average and 141,000,000 greater than last year's production.

**Billion Bushel Wheat Yield.**

The outlook for the billion bushel wheat yield continues to grow. Latest estimates raise the prospective production to 963,000,000 bushels, an increase of 13,000,000 bushels since the last estimate. Winter wheat, however, shows a 9.7 per cent drop in condition, which reduces its prospective production 8,000,000. That is ascribed to rains in Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma. Other states were reported practically the same or better than a month ago. The Hessian fly's depredations are not reflected in the June report.

Those reports now at hand in the department of agriculture show that corn, winter wheat, oats, white and sweet potatoes and rice are growing on record acreages.

**CINCINNATI HUNTS BODIES**

Twenty-seven known dead in City's Worst Storm—Property Damage, \$1,000,000.

Cincinnati, Ohio, July 9.—Cincinnati has gathered the harvest of death sowed by the terrific tornado. Hourly the list of dead swelled as police and firemen dug into the ruins of homes and dragged the river for the dead. Police estimated nearly forty persons perished. Twenty known dead and scores injured and missing was the toll at 10 a. m. Property damage was estimated at \$1,000,000.

Cincinnati, July 10.—With 27 known dead, 10 missing, and property loss that will exceed \$1,000,000, Cincinnati is making a valiant effort to recover from probably the worst wind and rain storm of its history.

After the storm broke the city and its suburbs lay in almost total darkness, its telephone system paralyzed, and its street car service completely suspended.

Two steamboats had gone down in the Ohio river, one having hit a bridge pier, while the other was overturned by the force of the gale; probably 100 houses were leveled to the ground; a half-dozen lofty church spires were toppled and when the full extent of the damage was ascertained, it was found that few houses in the city had escaped damage.

The streets of the downtown district were strewn with electric signs and plate glass windows, while in the residence section and in the suburbs, every wagon and automobile traffic was made impossible by hundreds of trees uprooted and strewn across the thoroughfares. Probably 50 clubhouses along the Ohio river were swept into the stream and floated away.

**Liberty Bell at St. Joseph.**

St. Joseph, Mo., July 9.—Thousands of school children, each carrying a flag, marched through the business streets and passed in review before the Liberty bell. The bell arrived from Kansas City early in the evening. Large crowds turned out at Leavenworth and Atchison, where stops were made during the afternoon.

The party accompanying the relic was entertained at dinner at the Country club.

The bell has left for Omaha.

**To Move Railroad for Town.**

Pittsburgh, July 9.—Sewickley, the home of Pittsburgh's "ultra set," has accomplished the unbelievable. To make room for the town's boulevard, which the residents were determined to have, the Pennsylvania Railroad company has agreed to move its main line tracks from the present right-of-way to a new route. Old railroad officials here say that not in the history of railroad building in this country have they ever heard of a like instance. The new boulevard is to cost \$1,500,000.
