SUMMARY OF IMPORTANT HAPPENINGS IN FAR OFF NORTHWEST.

ITEMS FROM THE OLD HOME

Resume of the Most Important Events in Sweden, Norway and Denmark—Of Interest to the Scandinavians in America.

NORWAY.

The Norwegian steamer Drammenfjord arrived from Sandefjord and reported having been chased by a German submarine in the North sea between Bergen and Kirkwall.

Women are now voting on an equality with men for the first time in Norwegian general elections. There are 170,000 new electors on the rolls.

There is no rising hum of war talk in Norway. If not actually tabooed, conversation about the war is at least in bad form.

New shipyards are to be built at Jariso, near Tonsberg, for the construction of ships of a displacement of 6,000 tons or more.

During the first part of the summer the drought seemed to cripple the crops beyond recovery in the eastern part of the country.

DENMARK.

Farmer Tingleff recently sold the Skerrigaard estate for a consideration of \$85,000, which is 50 per cent more than he paid for the property three years ago.

The cherry crop at Southeast Himmerland was very large this year. The cannery at Had Sund could not handle all the berries offered.

In forestry, as well as in agriculture, Denmark stands deservedly high in the estimation of the scholars of the world.

Gardener Jorgensen of Munkemolle tells how he saw rats eating cherries from a tree: "I saw there was something up a cherry tree. At once I thought it was a bird, but I was astonished to see that it was a rat."

SWEDEN.

The English-Swedish commission, which has for two months been striving to adjust the trade differences between the two countries, is no nearer a satisfactory solution of the dispute than at the beginning of its session.

The English members of the commission argue that a large amount of supplies, many of which are directly connected with the maintenance of an army and the prolongation of the war, find transit through Sweden to Germany.

The Swedish members of the commission reply that her export laws which are rigidly enforced by the government, prohibit the sending of most articles to Germany and that exceptions are only made to this prohibitory list when she is forced into an exchange of supplies with Germany.

The issue which has caused a deadlock is the quantity of supplies sent to Germany under the special license contrary to Sweden's list of forbidden exports.

Admiral Lindman, former Swedish premier and present leader of the conservative party, denied that Sweden was prepared to make concessions in her trade dispute with England.

"It is unfortunate," said Admiral Lindman, "that no league of neutral powers was formed at the beginning of the war to safeguard the rights and privileges of the neutral nations."

There is only one combination of circumstances which is likely to draw Sweden into the war, in the opinion of Hjalmar Branting, leader of the socialist party of Sweden.

A bust of the late Viggo Ullmann, the educator and statesman, has been unveiled at Soljord, where he worked most energetically and successfully for many years.

The German submarines caused greater loss, comparatively, to Norwegian than to English shipping during the first quarter of the year, the percentage being as follows: Norway, 1.13; England, 1.07; France, 0.76; Sweden, 0.41; Denmark, 0.33; Holland, 0.27.
