

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ARISTIDE BRIAND. Said to Be Slated for Head of Reorganized French Cabinet.



A new French cabinet, headed by Aristide Briand as premier and minister of foreign affairs, has been formed. This is the first time in the history of the French republic that there is a coalition ministry of all the opposing parties and factions. It follows closely on the recent innovation of forming a British coalition cabinet of Conservatives and Liberals.

KING GEORGE INJURED IN FALL FROM HORSE

London, Oct. 30.—King George was thrown from his horse and severely bruised. The following official announcement was made: "While the king was inspecting his army in the field his horse, excited by the cheers of the troops, reared and fell. The king was bruised severely and will be confined to bed for the present."

BRITISH LOSSES SO FAR NEAR HALF MILLION. London, Oct. 30.—British casualties from the beginning of the war to Oct. 9 were 493,294, according to an official announcement given out by the war office. The killed in all areas are placed at 6,660 officers and 94,992 men, the wounded at 12,633 officers and 304,832 men and the missing at 2,000 officers and 72,177 men.

31,128 FILE FOR CLAIMS

Only One in Forty-five Will Draw North Dakota Land. Minot, N. D., Nov. 1.—More than 30,000 men and women are seeking the right to file on 700 homesteads in the Fort Berthold reservation, near here, which will be open to entry next May, the registration bringing out that number of landseekers.

FAVORITE SONS NUMEROUS

Many Candidates for Republican Presidential Nomination. New York, Oct. 27.—"From twelve to fifteen booms for 'favorite sons' will be launched at the Republican national convention next year and 'anything is likely to happen.'" This is the way in which James B. Reynolds, secretary of the Republican national committee, summed up the situation to Chairman Charles D. Hilles after visiting twenty-two states.

SERBIANS FLEE FROM BULGARS

Reported in Retreat Along the Entire Front.

CAPITAL IS REMOVED AGAIN

Nish Threatened With Capture and Place of Government Changed to "Certain Point."

London, Oct. 31.—The position of Serbia is becoming more desperate daily. Nish is threatened by the Bulgarians, while the Austrians and Germans are gradually opening the way toward the great Serbian arsenal at Kraguyevatz. Rome reports that the Serbian capital has been removed to a "certain point."

According to the latest official reports from Sofia the Serbians are in retreat in a westerly direction all along the Bulgarian front. Unofficial dispatches state that a Bulgarian officer commanding advance patrol has dined with the Austro-German staff. The Bulgarians assert that they are in possession of Negotin, Brza Palanka, Zajecar, Kniajevatz and several villages in the Timok valley, which gives them a strategic position of primary importance.

The complete capture of Pirot is not claimed by the war office at Sofia, which says the Bulgarians, after storming the southern fortifications, penetrated the town, where night put an end to the fighting.

French Hold Strumitsa. With the exception of the unofficial report that the French are now firmly in possession of Strumitsa no news has been received concerning the military movements of the entente allies in the Balkans.

From Bulgarian sources admissions have been received that the seraports recently bombarded suffered severely. A Bucharest dispatch says that Russian troops have set sail from Odessa and Sebastopol for the Bulgarian coast.

Along the other fronts severe fighting is reported, without decisive results. An important struggle is in progress on the Austro-Italian line. Vienna reports Italian attacks were repulsed after a sanguinary struggle. The cabinet changes in France are finding an echo in the discussion as to the advisability of creating a British war council, to consist of the premier, war secretary and first lord of the admiralty, to have supreme direction of the war.

FIGHTING IN MONTENEGRO

Austrians Launch Campaign Against Former Country. Rome, Oct. 31.—Some of the bloodiest fighting in Europe is reported in progress along the Austro-Montenegrin frontier. The Montenegrins have embarrassed the Austrian attack on the Western Serbian border by fierce flank assaults. To stop this an Austrian campaign was launched against them. Taking advantage of one of the world's most difficult mountain countries the Montenegrins have entrenched themselves so effectively that they have held their own thus far.

RUSS TROOPS TO BALKANS

Large Contingents Sail From Odessa and Sebastopol. Copenhagen, Oct. 31.—Large contingents of Russian troops have set sail from the Black sea ports of Odessa and Sebastopol for the Bulgarian coast, the Berlin Tageblatt says. The dispatch, telegraphed to the Tageblatt from Bucharest, says that the transports are conveyed by a strong squadron. The recent attack by Russian warships on the Bulgarian port of Varna, according to this account, was made in preparation for an attempt to land troops.

RUSSIA IS SEEKING LOAN

Said to Be Willing to Pay High Rate of Interest. New York, Oct. 29.—It was reported from sources considered reliable that agents of the Russian government are seeking to establish a credit loan in this country of from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000, and even more if the money can be obtained. In one quarter it was reported that the Russian government was willing to pay as high as 9 per cent interest.

Canada to Enlist More Men

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 31.—Canada will put a quarter of a million men into the European war. This is Canada's answer to the call for more men by England. It means enlisting 100,000 more soldiers. Japan Opposes Chinese Monarchy. Peking, Oct. 30.—President Yuan Shi Kai, who had practically determined to restore the monarchy and make himself emperor of China, has been notified that Japan at present is opposed to any changes in the government of China likely to lead to internal revolution.


