British Munitions Minister Becomes Secretary of War.

LLOYD-GEORGE MADE SECRETARY FOR WAR

London, July 8.—The appointment of David Lloyd-George British secretary for war was announced. He was raised to this rank from that of minister of munitions, which post he has held since the opening of the present war.

The Earl of Derby, director of recruiting, has been appointed under secretary for war.

The new secretary of war has been the man of the hour in England in recent years and is the man looked to in the present crisis to give renewed stability to the cabinet.

In the recent riots in Dublin it was Lloyd-George who was called on to bring peace and straighten out the tangle of relations caused by the arbitrary orders issued by the war department in respect to treatment of Irish rebels.

CAUCUS AGREES TO PASS SHIPPING BILL

Washington, July 10.—Democratic senators in caucus reached an agreement on the government shipping bill to upbuild the American merchant marine, ending one of the most serious party divisions that has occurred in the life of the Wilson administration.

Differences which led to a Democratic revolt at the last session of congress and resulted in failure of the shipping purchase bill had threatened the pending measure, earnestly advocated by President Wilson, with a like fate.

Amendments submitted, however, ironed out all serious differences and senators who had been fighting each other on the issue shook hands, resolving to press the bill for passage at this session no matter how long it may delay adjournment.

Changes proposed by the Democrats of the commerce committee and agreed to by the caucus do not alter the principle of the bill, which already has passed the house.


MOOSE TO HAVE BIG PART IN CAMPAIGN

New York, July 7.—Charles E. Hughes, here on a two days' trip from his summer home at Bridgehampton, approved the proposal of his advisers to have a liberal representation of the Progressive party on his campaign committee.

This committee virtually will have entire charge of the campaign. The tentative program calls for a committee of seventeen, of whom ten will be members of the executive committee of the Republican national committee.

Of the remaining seven probably five will be Progressive leaders. The personnel of both the executive committee and the campaign committee probably will be announced within the next few days, as well as the selection of a treasurer and a secretary of the national committee.

ELIE METCHNIKOFF. Scientist Who Studied Means to Prolong Life Is Dead.



Professor Elie Metchnikoff, the famous bacteriologist and exponent of life, is dead at Paris. He was seventy-one years of age.

Professor Metchnikoff had been in poor health for several months. Professor Elie Metchnikoff was particularly famous as an exponent of theories for the prolongation of human life.

MEASURE EXCLUDES ULSTER COUNTIES

London, July 12.—Premier Asquith in explaining the Irish agreement in the house of commons, said it was proposed the bill should remain in force during the war and twelve months thereafter and if parliament had not made further provision by that time for a government of Ireland the period can be extended.

Representatives of the imperial executive, the prime minister said, would have control of the defense of the realm act.

While not going into details the premier indicated the main lines of the agreement included the exclusion of six Ulster counties. He said the Irish parliament would be composed of the members at present returned to the imperial parliament, while the appeal court in Dublin would be appointed by the imperial executive.

MORE LUXURIES PURCHASED U. S. Imports From London Show Gain of \$20,000,000.

Washington, July 17.—Value of imports from London during the six months ending June 30 were \$90,000,000, as compared with \$70,000,000 in the corresponding period of 1915.

Rubber, the principal import, decreased nearly 50 per cent, however, and wool imports were four times less.

Shipments of precious stones were three times greater and art imports were doubled.

MAY BE SETTLED BY COMMISSION

Difficulties Between Mexico and the United States.

POLK AND ARREDONDO MEET

Acting Secretary of State and Mexican Ambassador Designate in Conference.

Washington, July 15.—Solution of difficulties between the United States and Mexico seem to trend more and more toward settlement by an international commission.

Informal conferences by Acting Secretary of State Polk and Eliseo Arredondo, Mexican ambassador designate, it was indicated, were developing questions for probable submission to such a body.

General Carranza is said to approve the commission plan of settling differences as provided in the treaty of 1848, and state department officials are believed to be willing to let things take this course, though preferring adjustment through the present conferences.

President Wilson, it is understood, is not dissatisfied with the direction negotiations are taking.

Both Mr. Polk and the ambassador are confident that an agreement will be reached in the near future.

Mr. Arredondo issued a statement warning against sensational stories published throughout this country by those who desire intervention.

"I beg to warn the American people," he said, "against the falsity of reports published within the last few days, constituting an actual propaganda system, by persons interested in causing a conflict between the two countries."

CARRANZA OPPOSED TO WAR

Wants Friendly Relations With the United States.

Mexico City, July 15.—General Carranza, in an interview, said that the status of the negotiations with Washington was very satisfactory as the result of the good will shown to each other by Mexico and the United States.

"Thanks to this feeling of good will," the first chief continued, "we will be able to avoid war. War is something I do not desire, but if there were no other remedy for the situation I would enter upon it."

General Carranza, however, refused to discuss the situation as it relates to the possible action of President Wilson or of the Latin-American nations which offered to mediate in the trouble between the United States and Mexico.

PERSHING BELIEVES DIFFICULTY SETTLED

Washington, July 14.—General John J. Pershing believes the trouble between the United States and Mexico is settled. In a report to the war department he made this statement, supplementing a report that "Mexicans in this vicinity (the vicinity of his column), along the Mexican railroad, are reported friendly toward Americans in the last few days."

Authority from the state department to permit restoration to normal of movement into Mexico of all commodities except munitions of war was asked by the treasury department.

CONGRESS ASKED TO HELP

Appropriation Urged to Fight Infantile Paralysis.

Washington, July 13.—Secretary McAdoo has asked congress to appropriate \$135,000 for the public health service to aid in the fight against the infantile paralysis epidemic in New York and to prevent its spread to other states. The estimate was approved by President Wilson. Dr. W. C. Rucker, who has been in active charge of the fight against the epidemic, believes it will cost about \$10,000 a month for the work of the service alone.

DOES NOT EXPECT TROUBLE

Roosevelt Abandons Plan to Raise Volunteer Army.

New York, July 15.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt has abandoned, for the present at least, his plan to raise a division of volunteer troops, according to an announcement by Regis H. Post, former governor of Porto Rico, who has had charge of recruiting.

MARTIAL LAW IS IN EFFECT

State of Siege at Madrid on Account of Railway Strike.

Paris, July 14.—The city and province of Madrid have been declared by the government in a state of siege on account of the strike of railway employes, according to Havas dispatch from the Spanish capital.
