OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF SCHOOL DIST. NO. 2.

Friday, Sept. 8, 1916.
 Called to order at 2 o'clock P. M. at the Chicago Bay school house.
 Present—Jacobson, Ellingsen, Hoyt and Bray. Absent—Ellquist and Roberts.

On motion Bray appointed clerk pro tem.
 On motion, unanimously voted that any child that fails to behave properly while being transported to and from school should be denied the privilege of transportation service; this action to apply to all the school rigs employed by the district.

Sealed bids for the transportation of the Chicago Bay pupils to the North School were then opened, as follows:
 1. Charles Peterson, \$47.00 per Mo.
 2. Mrs. G. Woodard, 46.90 per Mo.
 3. Ester Jacobson, 49.00 per Mo.
 4. Theo. Olson, 49.49 per Mo.
 5. John Eliassen, 50.00 per Mo.
 6. Wm. Harriman, 49.75 per Mo.

On motion voted to award contract to Charles Peterson, providing he accepts and qualifies, otherwise to Theo. Olson, the next lowest bidder, the bond in either case to be \$200, subject to the approval of a committee consisting of Directors Jacobson and Ellingsen.

On motion, clerk was instructed to purchase a bell for the Birchwood school, and the Birchwood school committee was directed to have a bell for same built on the west end of roof.
 On motion, Director Hoyt was added to the Birchwood school committee and the committee was directed to have the school grounds cleared up as soon as possible, all the well-formed live trees to be left standing.

On motion, voted to buy a box of 40 per cent dynamite from A. Arquist for use on the Birchwood school grounds.
 On motion, the Birchwood school committee was authorized to have the necessary sidewalks built, the same to be 5 1/2 feet wide to the main road, 6 feet wide across the front end of the school building, and 2 feet wide to the woodshed and closets.

On motion, voted to have the Hoyt Bros. saw into stove wood the logs on the Birchwood school-ground, clearing.

On motion, upon separate consideration of each, bills were allowed as follows:

On motion, it was ordered that hereafter all bills against the District must be clearly itemized and O.K'd by the committee or director authorizing same, otherwise to be rejected or returned for completion.
 On motion, voted to appoint Chairman Jacobson a committee to ask the County Board to put in a 16-foot culvert crossing at the Birchwood school grounds; and it was further ordered that the committee be authorized to have put in 32 feet of 2x12 inch plank culvert laid so as to make an opening 8x12 inches, along the front of the school grounds.
 There being no further business meeting adjourned.

 Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, that the necessary proceedings be commenced to acquire the land necessary for the improvement so petitioned for and that the president and recorder be authorized and instructed to take all steps and do all things necessary to be done in that behalf.
 After the reading of the resolution Trustee Toftey moved its adoption, which was duly seconded and was declared adopted, all present voting Aye. There being no further business the council adjourned sine die.

 In the Matter of the Application of the Village of Grand Marais, Cook County, Minnesota, by the Common Council of said Village, for the condemnation of certain lands in said County:

To Grand Marais Realty Company, a corporation, Herbert R. Spencer and Alexander J. McCumber:
 You, and each of you, are hereby notified that the undersigned, Village of Grand Marais, Cook County, Minnesota, by the Common Council of said Village, will, on the 14th day of November, 1916, at 10 o'clock A. M. of that day, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, at the court-house in the City of Duluth, St. Louis County, Minnesota, present to the District Court for said County of Cook its written and verified petition, the object of which petition is to obtain an order of said court authorizing it to be necessary to take the lands hereinafter described for public use, for street purposes, and appointing commissioners to appraise the damages which may be occasioned by such taking.

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION OF GRAND MARAIS STATE BANK

Know All Men by These Presents, That we have agreed to, and do hereby associate ourselves together as a Banking Corporation, under and pursuant to the provisions of the Laws of the State of Minnesota governing Banks of Discount and Deposit; and to that end we do hereby execute under our hands and seals the following Certificate of Incorporation, to-wit:

FIRST
 The name of this corporation shall be the Grand Marais State Bank. The general nature of its business shall be banking, receiving deposits, buying, selling and discounting notes, bills and other evidences of debt, domestic and foreign, dealing in gold and silver bullion and foreign coins, issuing circulating notes and loaning money on real estate and personal security; and the place where the business of this corporation is to be carried on is Grand Marais, Cook County, Minnesota.

SECOND
 Said corporation shall commence on the 28th day of August, A. D. 1916, and shall continue for the period of thirty years.
