HAPPENINGS IN GOPHER STATE

News From All Parts of Minnesota Given in Condensed Form.

EVENTS BRIEFLY TOLD

Where Busy Readers Will Find News From All Parts of State Terealy Chronicled for Their Benefit.

Hastings.—A man believed to be O. J. Wurume, who escaped recently from the Ohio state prison was arrested here.

Duluth.—Five hundred members of the Minnesota Dairymen's association were in Duluth for the annual convention.

Duluth.—For five nights women were attacked in the downtown streets in Duluth, according to reports given the police.

Hibbing.—Frank Kyrel, who gave his home as St. Paul, was arrested here on a charge of assault preferred against him by a woman.

Duluth.—Bounties paid by St. Louis county to trappers and wolf hunters in 1919 totaled \$19,470, according to the county auditor's report.

Hibbing.—Company M, Minnesota National Guard, at Hibbing, will start an active recruiting campaign this month to build the company to full strength.

Gonvick.—Anton H. Helland, a well known merchant here, is dead. He came to this section of the state 40 years ago. He leaves a widow and seven children.

Hutchinson.—The amount expended during the year 1919 for new buildings and improvements in the city amounted to \$168,325. Thirty-four new homes were built.

Owatonna.—Steel county will spend \$134,305.10 on state and township roads this year, according to plans outlined by the county board at its annual meeting here.

Winona.—Miss Louisa Kohler, 44, a resident of Altura, Winona county, was burned to death when an oil stove on which she was preparing dinner exploded, setting fire to her clothing.

Luverne.—Ninety-seven marriage licenses were issued during the last year in Rock county, which is 41 more than the previous year and 15 more than the average for the past 12 years.

Mankato.—Committees have been appointed at a meeting of local businessmen to obtain a site for the proposed \$200,000 armory, which would be the headquarters of the Fifth regiment.

Albert Lea.—Arrangements are being completed for Albert Lea's winter carnival to be staged here from Jan. 28 to 31. In addition to a parade there will be skating, skiing and tobogganing contests.

Fergus Falls.—There are 42 head of cattle for every section of land in Otter Tail county. Figures compiled show that the county has \$94,701 cattle, 29,233 horses, 25,616 hogs and 16,623 sheep.

Thief River Falls.—Gunder Kolshus, a farmer living near here, has been adjudged insane and taken to the state asylum at Fergus Falls. He had killed 40 head of his livestock before

HAVE PETITIONED FOR BETTER MAIL SERVICE

machines, the counties obligated to keep the roads in condition, the postmaster at Two Harbors or Duluth acting as supervisor, and mail service 3 days a week to facilitate regularity, would no doubt solve the problem.

It may be added, in order to prove that the present contractor does not do all he can to bring in the mail, that a train is running regularly once a week between Knife River and Cramer station on the Northeastern Minnesota Railroad (Alger Smith's line), in Lake county. He could if he cared have each week's second class and parcel mail hauled by the train for that distance, and then further on the excellent roads in Cook county by the big army trucks of which we got several from the government, and which have, as already said, passed daily with heavy loads, at the same time snow-plowing when needed with the result that the road surface is as level as a floor.

Former contractors have taken this course to haul mail by railroad for some distance, when transportation over the roads was difficult. If the present contractor has not machines strong enough to carry the mail over the Lake county roads, he could use the train when it goes, as a help out. There has been no excuse this winter up to date, however, for his failure to come through with the mail, for all kinds of autos have passed the same road, and on record time. A Ford even covered the distance from Cramer to Two Harbors (about 60 miles) in 3 hours last week.

South St. Paul.—Eighty-one head of show cattle were sold for \$49,530 at the auction conducted by the Minnesota Hereford Breeders' association at the sale pavilion of the stockyards here. An average of \$611 for the eighty-one head was returned. Forty-one bull brought \$20,340, or an average of \$507. The highest price paid for a bull was \$4,100 by Fred Bade of Lake City. Forty cows brought \$28,990, or an average of \$725. William Hartnett of Chicago paid \$3,750, the record price of any cow sold.
