FIVE SOCIALISTS REFUSED SEATS

Are Barred From Sitting in Assembly of New York Legislature.

ACTION TAKEN QUICKLY

Men Affected Must Show Their Loyalty To Nation and State--Link with Aliens Pointed Out By Speaker.

Albany, N. Y.—Five Socialist members of the assembly of the New York State Legislature were denied their seats at the opening meeting of the 1920 session.

A resolution questioning whether they could be loyal to their oaths of office when bound to act subject to instructions of the Socialist party was quickly passed, 140 to 6, after Thaddeus C. Sweet, speaker, with dramatic suddenness, ordered the sergeant at arms to bring the Socialist members before the bar of the House.

Party Platform Flayed. The session was dragging as the clerk was calling for routine resolutions when speaker Sweet interrupted him. The Socialists were ushered before the speaker's desk in the pit of the house.

"You are seeking seats in this body—you who have been elected on a platform that is absolutely inimical to the best interests of the state of New York and of the United States," the speaker said. "That platform is the doctrine of the Socialist party. It is not truly a political party, but is a membership organization admitting within its ranks aliens, enemy aliens and minors."

Barred Men's Statement. "We regard our exclusion from the assembly as organized violence on the very essence of democracy—the sacred right of the ballot," said a statement issued by the Socialist assemblymen.

"It is the denial of representative government. It is the shameful establishment of an ugly dictatorship—the dictatorship of naked plutocracy."

GIVES DATA TO SENATORS

Daniels Submits List of Officers Cited for Honors. Washington.—Coincident with the appointment by Chairman Page of the Senate naval committee of a subcommittee to investigate the naval decoration controversy, Secretary Daniels transmitted to Senator Page a complete list of all officers and enlisted men considered by the navy's board of awards for service decorations as recommended by commanding officers.

The list transmitted by Secretary Daniels comprised more than 3,500 names and the charts accompanying it tell a graphic story of the fate of each recommendation as it passed through the hands of the board and finally was acted on by the secretary.

Coolidge Inaugurated Second Time. Boston.—The need of humanizing government and industry and of maintaining obedience to this law was stressed by Governor Coolidge to the Legislature in his address, inaugurating his second term. He urged more effort in production, and economy on the part of both state and individual. The duty that government now owes to the people, he said, "is to reduce their burdens by paying off obligations that came from the war rather than imposing additional burdens for new projects."

SCHOOLS ASKED TO AID THRIFT STAMP WEEK. A bulletin from Washington announces a Thrift Stamp week, beginning Monday, March 1 and ending Saturday, March 6.

The principal sphere of activity will be in the schools and while the effort is not intended, says the announcement, "to sell a tremendous number of savings stamps," every effort will be made to awaken new interest on the part of pupils and parents in practicing practical thrift. "Every school in the Ninth Reserve District," said M. E. Harrison, director of the District's War Savings Organization, "will be asked to cooperate and a determined campaign will be waged to make this territory lead the remainder of the United States and as the movement, under the authority of the Savings Division of the Treasury department, is national in scope, the Northwest once more faces a new test of that Americanism which during the war period, and since, has so frequently stood supreme."

The Thrift week campaign calls for the active cooperation of all educators, from state superintendents down to the teacher in the grades. "The government is sending out instructions, literature and pledge cards—the pledge cards will play an important part—but the real success in every locality will rest on the shoulders of the superintendent and his fellow workers," explained Mr. Harrison.

"Every child in America should be made acquainted with the fact that 25 cent Thrift Stamps are a splendid means of saving money. Parents should know what a fine thing it is for their children to cultivate saving habits through the agency of the Thrift Stamp. "So during the week of March 1 this effort to arouse thrift interest in the schools and homes will be made. Through the public press, school journals, notices on school bulletin boards, women's clubs, programs, lodge meetings and in various other ways the message of the 25 cent United States Thrift Stamp will be carried. During the week specific programs will be carried out. Every educator, pupil and parent is asked to make Thrift Stamp week a success."
