REPUBLICAN CO. CONVENTION OF COOK COUNTY

Pursuant to the call of the Republican State Central Committee and of the Republican District Committee for this Congressional District, a Republican County Convention for this county is hereby called to meet at the court house in the Village of Grand Marais, Minnesota, on Wednesday, March 17, 1920, at 9 o'clock A. M., for the purpose of electing six delegates to the State Convention to be held at the Auditorium in Saint Paul on Saturday the twentieth day of March, 1920. And also, six delegates to attend a Republican Convention for this Congressional district which is to be held on Friday, the 19th day of March 1920. The said District and State Conventions to elect delegates to attend the National Republican Convention to be held in the City of Chicago, Illinois, on the eighth day of June, 1920. Said State Convention also to nominate twelve Republican Presidential Electors for the State of Minnesota as provided by law.

All primaries for the election of delegates to said County Convention are hereby called to be held on Monday, the fifteenth day of March, 1920, between the hours of 7:30 o'clock P. M. and 8:30 o'clock P. M. in the various election districts or precincts of this county and at the regular polling places in said election districts or precincts.

Following the recommendation of said Republican State Central Committee, each election district or precinct in this county shall have the delegate allotted for every twenty votes cast for the Republican candidate for governor at the general election in the year 1918 or major fraction thereof; provided, however, that every election district or precinct shall have at least one delegate to this county convention.

Said Republican State Central Committee will furnish presidential preferential ballots for use in the several election districts or precincts of this county with the names of the avowed Republican candidates for presidential nominations printed thereon and blank spaces for marking and writing arranged that each voter may express his preference for presidential nomination. And the clerk of each election district or precinct in this county, shall, in making his report upon the credentials of delegates elected, to include therein a statement of the presidential preference in his election district or precinct, if any such preference shall be expressed by the electors thereof.

These reports shall accompany the credentials of the delegates to the County Convention and shall be instructions to said delegates to support candidates for delegates to the National Convention favorable to the candidate receiving the highest number of votes in the election district or precinct.

In accordance with the above apportionment, the several election districts or precincts of this county are entitled to the following number of delegates to said County Convention:

County Farm Bureau Column

Awards in the State Boys' and Girls' Club Contests have been announced by T. A. Erickson, State Club Leader, and Cook county has reason to be proud of the showing made by its club members. Andrew Tofte, jr., who won a championship silver cup and cash prize of ten dollars at the Moorhead Potato Show for his exhibit of Rurals, is a winner for his club work in the state contest also, winning a first prize of ten dollars, a gold club medal, and a trip to the 1920 State Fair. Hilbert Jones also wins a trip to the Fair. Ole Huseby gains a silver club medal and two dollars in cash. Alvin Tofte takes a second prize of seven dollars for Rurals, and Hjalmer Tofte a fifth prize of two dollars. The Tofte Potato Club takes second place in the contest for clubs and is awarded a club prize of fifteen dollars. For his good work in the Poultry Contest, Cecil Brownell is awarded the club medal, taking second place in the state contest. It is worthy of note that of the 11 prizes offered by the Northern Minnesota Development Association for Rurals, four were won by Cook county boys, who take \$21 of the total \$39 offered for that variety. In addition to the total cash winnings of \$46, the boys have to their credit one gold, one silver, and one club medal. The boy or girl who enters any of the club contests agrees to keep work and expense records, to exhibit at the county or local fair, and to make a final report which includes the writing of a story of his or her experiences in carrying on the work. Club work appeals in many ways to the active, healthy boy or girl. It satisfies the cravings for ownership and earning, develops ability and self-reliance, thus affording valuable training for body and mind. Because of the recognition of its merits, the work has the support of the Federal and state governments, associations and individuals. But it needs most of all the support which can be given by the fathers and mothers. Interest on their part and assistance to the boys and girls in getting started counts for much. And that such encouragement brings results is proved by the success of Cook county boys in last year's contests.
