ROAD BUILDING PROGRAM FOR COOK COUNTY TO BEGIN

County Board Meeting Tuesday

Charles E. Forbes, state highway engineer, who has charge of the North Shore road, attended the meeting of the County Board Tuesday. He arrived late and the meeting was held open until he came, there being an evening session.

The county will issue bonds to pay the labor and the state will take care of the bonds out of the road money as it is paid into the state from the automobile tax.

Mr. Forbes stated that the road money is now coming in fast. As there has been an extension of one month in which to pay this tax, there will be a slight delay in getting the bulk of the fund. There will, however, be no delay in starting on the road work now, and the new Cook county state road will be oeg in, the part to be built this season to be from Cross River to Little Marais.

Harry Colwell, state engineer in charge of maintenance, is in the county and attended the county board meeting also. Both gentlemen accompanied Engineer Smith to Grand Marais Tuesday, Mr. Smith returning from a visit to the state department of highways in St. Paul.

The maintenance work in Cook county will be carried on this year with the same force and the same manner as last year.

SOIL ROBBING WEEDS MOUNTED FOR DISPLAY

To help every man, woman and child in Minnesota to recognize Canada and sow thistles, quackgrass and

dodder when they see them, A. H. Larson, seed and plant analyst at University Farm, and members of his staff are mounting specimens of these leading plant pests. The specimens are placed against a background of cotton on a strong cardboard with transparent celluloid front and metal binders or frames. Each is 10 by 15 inches and is designed for display in offices of county agents and in other public places. A charge to cover only the actual cost of production is made for this series of mountings.

FARM WOMEN'S WEEK TO BE HELD JUNE 20-23 AT MORRIS

The West Central School of Agriculture at Morris, which is part of the department of agriculture of the University of Minnesota, has again invited the farm women of its territory to spend a vacation of four days at the school, from June 20 to 23 inclusive, to participate in the sessions of the annual Farm Women's week. The beautiful campus and buildings of the school will be turned over to the women from the farms. Speakers from the staff of the agriculture school will be reinforced by professors and specialists from the state university, particularly from its department of agriculture. Superintendent P. E. Miller of the Morris school says the short course of last year was such a success that practically every woman who attended it has already signified her intention of returning this year.
