**U. S. WARNED OF COAL SHORTAGE**

Senator Freylinghuysen Forecasts Tragedy Impending Over America.

**FUEL OPERATORS HIT**

Says Mine Owners Have United Into "One Big Union" to Gouge Coal Buyers and to Oppose Government Supervision.

Washington—A warning that a "tragedy in the nature of a coal famine" is impending over the United States, and an assertion that all national organizations in the coal industry "have united into 'one big union' to continue their strangle hold on the necks and purses of coal buyers," defeating Federal legislation intended to cope with the problem, were issued by Senator Freylinghuysen, Republican of New Jersey.

Refers to Row Over Bills. The statement referred to the controversy over the Freylinghuysen bills, now on the senate calendar, one of which would facilitate granting of freight rates on coal lower in summer and higher in winter, while the second would establish government supervision of coal prices, production, stocks and movements.

Naming the National Coal association, the Anthracite Coal Operators' association, the American Wholesale Coal association, and the National Retail Coal Merchants' association, Senator Freylinghuysen said these "combined organizations have unmasked their batteries, and are attacking with a violence almost unprecedented the very practical piece of legislation before the Senate," and were endeavoring by "misstatements and misrepresentations" to "throw dust in the eyes of the Senate and the public."

Operators' Sincerity Doubted. Coal operators, Senator Freylinghuysen said, always asserted that high prices during recent shortage periods never brought them great profits. "But I am disposed to believe they have never been sincere, and have never told the truth regarding operators' profits," and in "hectic filibuster" lobbyists of the "bombastic furioso type" are issuing "propaganda of grotesquely inaccurate and misleading nature," to make it appear that govern-

ment operation of mines is involved in the legislation.

"If those bills are defeated, a tragedy next fall and winter in the nature of a coal famine, worse than ever experienced before, is inevitable," Senator Freylinghuysen said, pointing out that his measures would come to vote or be sent back to committee next week.

"The fact is, I doubt if this famine can be avoided, but we can prevent a second tragedy a year later."

**TIMBER CUT OVER 2 BILLION**

Large Proportion of Minn. Timber Used in States as Finished Product. Minneapolis—Approximately 2,390,000,000 feet of timber were cut in Minnesota in the past year and 1,740,000,000 feet were used for various purposes in the state, according to W. T. Cox, state forester.

The timber cut in the state went to make up lumber for laths, shingles, and pulpwood. In addition to the large amount cut 450,000,000 feet were shipped into the state, while more than 700,000,000 feet were shipped out Mr. Cox announced.

Of the 1,740,000,000 feet of timber used in Minnesota, more than 275,000,000 feet were utilized for the construction of dwellings; 150,000,000 feet for farm improvements; 180,000,000 feet, railroads; 200,000,000 feet, factories, stores, offices, hotels, and public buildings, 50,000,000 feet for mining timber; 120,000,000 feet for pulp and paper; 75,000,000 feet telephone and telegraph companies; and 100,000,000 feet was used for miscellaneous purposes.

**DOMINIONS ACCEPT STATUS**

Canadian Premier Dissents on East and West Racial Equality.

London—Premiers of the British dominions, having accepted the new empire status as outlined by Lloyd George, are expected to draft plans for carrying the proposal into effect when the imperial conference is resumed.

There was only one dissenting vote to Lloyd George's plan. It was that of Premier Meighen of Canada, who made a reservation on behalf of Canada in connection with accepting Mr. Lloyd George's dictum that the future of the world rests on complete racial equality between the east and west. At the same time Mr. Srinivasi, the Indian delegate, demanded the Indians already located in other parts of the British dominions full equality in British citizenship.

**Cattle Train Wrecked; Loss \$6,000.**

St. Paul—Cattle valued at more than \$6,000 were killed in St. Paul when a Great Northern cattle train was wrecked north of the Westminster street bridge. Failure of the engineer to see a derail signal is said to have caused the wreck.

**Italians and Poles Clash.**

Paris—An encounter between Italian and Polish troops south of Kosel, Upper Silesia, is reported in a dispatch from the semi-official Wolff bureau of Berlin.

**IGATE FLIER'S LEAP**

Postal Officials Doubt Need of 2,500 Foot Parachute Drop.


Minneapolis—An official investigation of the mail plane crash near Mendota in which Pilot C. C. Eversole made a parachute drop of 2,500 feet, will be conducted in Minneapolis. Carl F. Egge, superintendent of the Twin Cities-Chicago air mail service, will take charge of the investigation, Frank H. Tower, assistant superintendent, announced.

Postal officials are not at all certain that Eversole's spectacular leap was necessary.




