THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

"TAMMANY" WHEN political reports state that such-and-such a person is the "Tammany candidate" or that "the Tammany organization is back of a certain move," the expression is understood to refer to a prominent organization in New York—but the fact that it receives its name from a noted Indian chief is overlooked.

Tamanend, the chief in question, was the ancient, wise and friendly head of the Delaware tribe of Indians who, for want of a better candidate, was "canonized" by the soldiers of the American Revolution as the patron saint of the new country.

The Tammany organization dates from May 12, 1789, when it was formed for benevolent and social purposes, but eventually became an important political body, formally chartered in 1805 and opposing the so-called "Aristocratic Society of the Cincinnati." It was essentially anti-federalist or democratic in its character and its chief founder was William Mooney, an American upholsterer of Irish extraction.

GRAPHS DIVIDE DOLLARS

Graphs showing from where the average good roads dollars came and how it was used is another feature of review. One graph shows that the average roads dollar is made up of 63 cents of road and bridge tax funds, used on local roads, and 17 cents of motor vehicle taxes, 8 cents of federal aid and 12 cents of county reimbursement bond money.

MAIN WORK PERMANENT

Of the average dollar used for new construction on trunk routes, Mr. Kipp's report discloses, 40 cents went into permanent grades to make lasting foundations for highway surfacing that future traffic may demand.
