


Henry Eliassen, of Hovland, is a student at the Oak Park high school. That is not remarkable, but he is leading a class of 331 pupils in scholarship and athletics. That is a "consummation devoutly to be wished." He is now a senior and the "lion of the hour." He was recently elected president of his class.

Outside of football, studying and working "Swede" doesn't find much spare time, but he did stop long

enough to unload this much information. He was born in northeastern Minnesota in 1903. He attended grammar school there, and upon finishing that course decided to continue to high school. Naturally enough he heard of Oak Park, and made up his mind to come down here. He soon became very much interested in our activities, and was enthusiastic from the first day of school.

"Swede" first began to shine in his sophomore year, when he copped best time and first place in the cross-country run. In his junior year he stepped out and made the record for this run that will not be duplicated for some time, unless by himself this year. He has played regular tackle on the football team for two years and has made a great difference in the defensive strength of our teams.

"Swede" has a few things to say for himself. "I would advise the freshmen to enter into athletics their first year. It cultivates friendship and also benefits the individual through the training. Now about study. The only things to which I can attribute success in scholarship are regular study habits. Freshmen should be especially anxious to do this, now that we have this new Honor Society."

The main reason why Henry received those two AA's and two A's, he says, is because he likes his teachers, so that he tries to do his lessons well. Agreeable teachers have a lot to do with the individual student's ability to master lessons. Henry says that he prefers "Hank" to "Swede" as a nickname, so please remember that.
