[OFFICIAL.] PROCEEDINGS OF THE POLICE JURY OF THE Parish of East Baton Rouge.

The Police Jury of the Parish of East Baton Rouge met this day, June 7th, 1853, at the Court House in the City of Baton Rouge, according to law; and were present—From ward No. 5 Thomas Devall; No. 6 J. B. Klempeter; No. 10. Seth David; No. 11. W. L. Campbell; No. 12. George Garig; Wm. Hubbs, Clerk.

On motion, Thomas De all was called to the chair. The President appointed Messrs Garig, Klempeter, and David, a committee to examine the credentials of newly elected members: whereupon said committee reported favorably on the following members, who taking the oath of office, presented themselves, and took their seats, viz: from ward No. 1. F. Arbour; No. 3. J. S. Taylor; No. 4. A. D. Alexander; No. 7. W. L. Burnett; No. 8. J. G. Washington; No. 9. Fergus Peniston.

On motion the Jury then proceeded to the election of President to their body; and on counting the votes it was found that Thomas Devall was unanimously elected.

On motion the Jury proceeded to the election of constable to their body; and on counting the votes it was found that Louis Powers had received the greatest number, and was declared elected.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved. The President appointed J. G. Washington on the finance committee in place of himself, being elected President of the board.

On motion, Messrs. J. S. Taylor, J. B. Klempeter, and F. Arbour were appointed a committee to examine the condition of the Jail; and to ascertain upon what terms a suitable Jail could be built, or the present one repaired.

On motion the Jury then adjourned until half past two P. M.

Monday Evening.

The Jury met agreeably to adjournment. Present—the same members as in the morning. The President called the meeting to order.

The committee on credentials, reporting favorably on the election of George V. Trudeau, member elect from ward No. 2, and he having taken the oath of office, took his seat.

A petition was presented—signed by W. Kelley and others, praying for an appropriation of seven hundred dollars, for rebuilding the bridge across the river Comite. On motion, said petition was laid over until to-morrow.

A petition, signed by R. B. D. Greenwell and others, was presented—praying for an appropriation of two hundred and fifty dollars, for rebuilding a bridge across Little Sandy Creek. On motion, said petition was laid over until to-morrow.

On motion the Jury then proceeded to the appointment of overseers of Roads for the ensuing year, and the following persons were appointed:

For Road District No. 3, Jac. Smith; 4 Baltazar Babin; 5 John Canty, east end; 5 A. Monget, west end; 6 Daul. Morgan, east end; 6 John Selser, west end; 7 G. W. Greenwell; 8 Thos. Montgomery, upper end; 8 David Smith, lower end; 9 L. Kelley, upper end; 9 John O. Denham, lower end; 10 E. Vanlaningham, north end; 10 Thomas Hutches, south end; 11 D. A. McCants, east end; 11 Jesse P. Carney, west end; 12 Samuel Lilley, north end; 12 H. L. Bogan, south end; 13 Wm. Pratt; 14 Richard Thomas; 15 David Stokes; 17 Robert Knox; 19 Wm. Klempeter; 20 Thomas McGlochlin; 21 H. B. Harrelson; 23 T. W. Brown; 24 Joseph Echugh; 25 Calvin Brown; east end; 25 Mathew Edwards, west end; 28 James Long; 31 Jeddiah Smith; 35 Williamson Kitchens; 36 Eli Norwood; 37 Victorin Aubin; 38 Edward Delaune; 39 Elle Jameson; 39 F. S. Mayes; 40 Meredith Lively; 41 John Carnena; old Marietta road, W. Johnson.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted:

Resolved, That Samuel M. More, be and is hereby appointed Road and Levee Inspector for Ward No. 8; and John M. Ronzan Road and Levee Inspector for Ward No. 9 for the ensuing year.

The following resolution was presented and adopted.

Resolved, That E. Vanlaningham be appointed Overseer of the North end of District No. 10, including the road from the upper line of Lewis Sterling, to the upper line of lands of O. C. Vanlaningham, and that part of the Road District No. 28 between the Baton Rouge road, (commencing at the lower line of lands of Isaac S. Taylor) and the Mississippi river. And that he be authorized to summon the following hands to work said road, viz: the hands of O. C. Vanlaningham, Henry R. Graham, William Stephe s. Isaac Taylor, Amie Umbehaegen, Rhodolph Umbehaegen, Chas. Griffith, Jackson Devall, Richard Devall, all laws to the contrary notwithstanding.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted.

Resolved, That Thomas Hutches be appointed overseer of the south end of road district No. 10, including the road from the upper limits of the Corporation of the town of Baton Rouge, to the upper line of the plantation of Lewis Sterling. And that he be authorized to summon the following hands to work said road, viz: The hands of Louis Sterling, A. Williams and Mr. Daugherty. All laws to the contrary notwithstanding.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted:

Resolved, That Wm. L. McNealy, be and he is hereby exempted from the payment

of the Parish license, for peddling within the limits of this Parish, for the term of twelve months.

On motion, Samuel Miller was stricken off of the list of paupers of the Parish.

On motion, a committee composed of Messrs. Peniston, Alexander and Campbell, were appointed to ascertain upon what terms the Printing of the Parish can be obtained for the ensuing year.

On motion Messrs. Trudeau & Tomlinson were appointed on the committee to examine and report upon the jail building.

On motion, the Jury then adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock a. m.

Tuesday Morning.

The Police Jury of the Parish of East Baton Rouge, met agreeably to adjournment were present, the same members as on yesterday. The President called the Jury to order. The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted:

Resolved, That the hands of Geo. Ames, John B. Whitaker, John P. Smith, and those of Capt. John Riley, be placed upon road district No. 31.

The following accounts against the Parish of East Baton Rouge, being presented by the Finance Committee, with their report thereon, were allowed, and the report adopted. The Finance Committee to whom was referred the following accounts, viz:

After strictly examining the foregoing accounts, your committee find the same to be correct. Your committee would further state, that the account of Dr. Louis Verry, of fifty two dollars for services rendered prisoners in jail, during the absence of Dr. Dearing, the Jail Physician, should be paid by the latter; as he receives from the Parish a fixed salary by the year. The account of Dr. Verry, of nine dollars and fifty cents for attending paupers, should not be paid by the Parish, as all the other Physicians do the same gratuitously. The account of Dr. S. P. Ward, of sixty dollars, for attending Mrs. Rieby's family, who are paupers upon the Parish, should not be paid, as the Parish is taxed to support her and family, and as similar services are rendered by all other physicians gratuitously.

Two petitions being presented, relative to the road leading from Mr. Burgess to Marietta. On motion, the whole matter was referred to a committee, composed of Messrs Garig, Klempeter and Burnett—who reported the following resolution, which was adopted.

Resolved, That the hands of J. H. Schenck, D. H. Penny, T. Canty, Pr. & Robert Wortham, work on the forks of the road, down to Robert Knox's road district—then on the Marietta road, embracing the two bridges on the Junes' Creek and the Beaver Dam Bayou.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted:

Resolved, That the hands of Paul Klempeter be removed from the lower end of district No. 19, to the upper end, under Wm. Klempeter, the overseer of said district, and that he be notified of the same.

A petition of J. J. Odom, Jailor, recommending the employment of a night watch for the security of the Jail, was, on motion, rejected.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted. And the following committee appointed thereon, viz.—Messrs. Klempeter, Arbour and Taylor.

Resolved, That a Committee of three, be appointed to contract for making and placing in the Jail, two or three cells to be composed of iron-bars—for the purpose of securing criminals committed to jail for the commission of grave offences.

The Committee to whom was referred the matter of the parish printing, reported by presenting the sealed proposals of the different offices in this town. The said proposals being opened, it was found that Mr. Geo. A. Pike's bid to perform all the printing required by the Parish for the sum of One Hundred and thirty-nine dollars and seventy-five cents for one year was the lowest; consequently, on motion the Jury declared unanimously, George A. Pike, the Printer of the Parish for the ensuing year.

A petition was presented of N. J. W. Wortham to be refunded sixteen dollars, the net proceeds of an animal sold as stray, and belonging to him. Said petition was granted.

On motion the Jury then adjourned until half-past 2 o'clock, p. m.

Tuesday Evening.

The Jury met agreeably to adjournment—present, the same members as in the morning. The President called the meeting to order.

On motion the Jury proceeded to the appointment of castrators of stud horses

running at large within the limits of the Parish, for the ensuing year; and the following appointments were made, viz:

For Ward No. 1 and 8, Anthony Monget Ward No. 2, Anthony Pina; No. 3, Wm. Stephens; Ward No. 4 and 5, Joseph Rodrigues; Ward No. 6, George Klempeter, jr. Ward No. 7 John B. Buziet; Ward No. 9, Gustave Lopez; Ward No. 10, Josiah Roberts; Ward No. 12 Alfred Monget.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted.

Resolved, That the Clerk of the Police Jury be and he is hereby required to keep the Papers of the Parish, at the Court House in the room in which they have been placed, and heretofore kept.

The following resolutions relative to the petitions presented yesterday and laid over for an appropriation of seven hundred dollars for building a Bridge across the Comite and \$250 for building a bridge across Little Sandy Creek was presented and adopted.

Resolved, That Messrs. Campbell, Trudeau and David, be and they are hereby appointed a committee to ascertain the probable cost of a Bridge across the Comite; and likewise to furnish plans and specifications for the same—and to report at the meeting to be held the last Monday of this month.

Resolved, That Joseph Pulliam, Saml. W. Watkins, and Wm. L. Campbell be, and are hereby appointed a committee to examine and report upon the probable cost of a Bridge across Little Sandy Creek; with plans and specifications for the same; and to report at the meeting to be held on the last Monday of this month.

The following resolution was proposed and adopted.

Resolved, That Mrs. Elizabeth McCulloch be and she is hereby stricken off the Pauper list; and that Mrs. Francois Riviva be placed on the pauper list, to receive five dollars per month.

On motion the Jury then adjourned until the last Monday of this month, (29th inst.) THOS. DEVAL, Pres't.
