GREAT SUIT.—The Commercial Bank of Manchester, at Yazoo City, Mississippi, on yesterday, through its counsel, L. Madison Day and Smiley & Perrin, filed a bill on the Equity side of the Circuit Court of the United States, in this city, against Henry S. Buckner, to have his discharge in Bankruptcy declared void, and to recover about \$120,000, principal and interest. The suit is one of great importance, and if sustained may lead to important results, as the principles settled in the same would be applicable to other similar cases.

Shakespeare as an Actor.—There is a very paradoxical belief existing in the present age founded on a spurious tradition, that Shakespeare never excelled as an actor, and only shone as the Ghost in his own "Hamlet." That he might have sometimes taken low parts, to put to shame the vanity of the inferior actors, was not improbable; but let it never be forgotten that in his celebrated panegyric, Ben Johnson speaks of his friends as much as an actor as an author.

THE SMELSER POISONING.—All the Accused Committed for Trial.—The examination of the witnesses in this case was concluded before Recorder Bright yesterday. Nothing new was elicited from them. The counsel for the defense submitted the case without argument, and the Recorder committed the accused, as charged—viz: Adam Scott as principal, and Theresa Smelser and her slave woman Kitty as accessories in the murder by poisoning of Levi Smelser, for trial in the First District Court. The prisoners were then removed back to prison, showing no more emotion than they did during the progress of the examination. They will have to wait some considerable time for their trial.—Crescent.
