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First District Recorder's Court. Jo Bernardo and E. Bernard, for willfully assaulting Special Officer Marks, at the corner of Franklin and Poydras streets, one with a pistol and the other with a chess knife, were each fined \$10.

Irwin Johnson was fined \$25 for maliciously opening a water-pipe. Robert Gibson paid a fine of \$10 for his negligence in trundling his bouquet-cart in the streets after prescribed hours. He promised to be prompt in disappearing hereafter.

John Sawley, a feminine assaulter and brawler on Barrie's Brandin, had her continued indolence. The suit had been withdrawn on account of proscritivity. Joseph Scott has retired to the workhouse for a space to improve his morals and to prevent him stealing silver-plated pictures from Mr. Bradford. Mr. B. has recovered his pitcher.

First Time in Thirty Years.—Dr. Bradford, parish coroner, yesterday found himself without his usual means to bury the dead and hold his court. The shortest and most reliable mode to bury the unknown suicide from the City park was to take a corporation ambulance that is at the service of the city's indigent dead and sick. To do this he obtained an order from a deputy street commissioner, and the charity wagon was used. The doctor, as soon as at liberty, walked to the city treasurer's office, and settled the account, amounting to eight dollars, which comes out of his own salary; for the coroner gets \$6000 a year, and buries at his own expensal suicides who have no friends to perform the last sad offices for them.

Was It an Accident?—John Lee, a middle-aged man, while employed on Metairie ridge in cutting wood or digging up trees, was severely wounded by a shot from an unknown hand. Lee's home is on Liberal street, between First and Philip streets. He was sent by Officer Kohler to the Marso hospital for surgical treatment. No arrest has been made.

Second District Recorder's Court.—The case of Alfred Honnen against J. Goulette and P. Forst, in which the latter are charged with embezzlement and breach of trust, was dismissed, the court deciding it to be purely a civil matter.

Lizzie Norton and Mary Ann Holly, or Haley, who are charged with having robbed a soldier named Morehead of \$200, have been arrested for such robbery. The twin girls, residing on St. Ferdinand street, and when first arrested gave bonds to appear, but failed to come to trial when the court was called. They were hid away somewhere in Greenvale, and were brought back as fugitives from justice. At the time the robbery is said to have been committed they were inmates of Emeline Gibson's shebang.

Stephen Watkins was arrested at the second district ferry landing for attempting to raise a rioting among men who were going to work on some United States plantations. The \$50,000 robbery.—Yesterday passed on the development made relative to the robbery at the Canal bank. The large amount of money that changed hands mysteriously, and in so prominent a location, drew many visitors to the bank just to see how the trick could or might have been done. The transaction being so well covered by the expert who suddenly enriched himself, has been the cause of the rise of various speculations, none of which we care to give our readers; guess the matter out for yourselves, and when any facts bearing on the case are exposed, be sure you will find them in this column.

Has no License.—Special Deputy A. Victor Ward arrested yesterday at Metairie ridge Henry Van Hooven, an affidavit made before United States Commissioner Urban, charging him with aiding and abetting a distillery in the basement of his home, without an internal revenue license, and in violation of the internal revenue laws.
