Armed Rebels Intimidate Voters--They threaten the Annihilation of Tanekes.

When the polls were opened at nearly all the voting places the rebels were armed and threatened to shoot those who dared to vote the Republican ticket.

The day before the election rebels notified freedmen in different parts of the parish that they should withdraw their votes from the polls.

They were threatened to shoot down men for voting the Republican ticket were allowed to retain their arms.

Some of the Democratic candidates told freedmen they could go to the polls and vote without molestation.

When they went to the polls they were told by the same men that freedmen who did not vote the Democratic ticket would be discharged from employment.

They were told that if they voted for the Republican ticket they would be shot down.

Two colored men told another that they ought to punish him for voting the Democratic ticket.

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The Legislature.

The Republican Senators for Carroll, Madison, and Morehouse are Hon. Curtis Pollard and Colonel John Lynch.

The Democratic Senators from Bossier, Bienville, and Caliborne are disfranchised.

Dr. Darrall, Republican, is elected in Vermillion and St. Mary.

There is no doubt of the election of Messrs. Williams and Lewis, Republicans, in De Soto, Natchitoches, and Sabine, as they have a majority of 1450 in Natchitoches alone.

We do not change our figures from yesterday--twenty-two Republicans and fourteen Democrats in the Senate.

The *Placemans* wants an explanation of the sentence that "this number will be ultimately reduced" in our reference to the fourteen Democrats.

The simplicity and innocence of our contemporary renders its ignorance of the frauds committed by Democrats in electing Senators and other officers quite excusable.

When one of the editorial writers of that paper takes his seat in the Senate he will learn how the number of "so-called" Democratic Senators will be diminished.

In the House of Representatives we do not reduce the number of Republican members now to be elected, fifty-eight.

We add the names of George W. L. McMillan and Colonel Yorke, Carroll parish, and Hon. Peter Harper, St. Charles parish, all Republicans.

To the twenty-six Democrats before reported elected to the House we add one from Calcasieu and one from Catahoula, making twenty-eight certain elected.

Yesterdays footings exhibited a majority of 19,794 for the Constitution in forty-two parishes.

Carroll parish, at length heard from; gives about 1200 majority for the Constitution.

Calcasieu gives 287 majority against the Constitution.

The vote of Jefferson is 584 majority for the Constitution instead of 859, as reported, and Pointe Coupee 1175 instead of 1509 majority for the Constitution.

St. Mary gives 1120 majority for the Constitution instead of 589.

These additions and corrections make the majority for the Constitution in forty-four parishes 20,672.

Most of our reports are from official sources, De Soto, Franklin, Sabine, and Vermillion to be heard from.

From Carroll Parish. A letter received from Carroll parish last evening, written by General W. L. McMillan, a subjugate rebel and a traitor to his country.

The canvass was an exciting one, every inch of ground being contested by the rebels, or Democrats, but with little effect.

Out of about 1850 voters the Republicans have 1200 majority.

John Lynch, senatorial district, Colonel John Lynch, and Mr. Curtis Pollard, senatorial district, are the only Republicans in the Senate.

These four gentlemen are Republicans.
