James Henry, charged with assault and battery, with intent to commit a rape on a young girl, was discharged. Evidence was conflicting.

ARREST OF AN ALLEGED SWINDLER.—Held over on habeas corpus.—Special Officers Pecora and Carr yesterday arrested W. W. Whitehead, on a requisition from the Governor of Illinois. The charges against Whitehead are that he fraudulently obtained from the State Savings Institution of Chicago the sum of \$25,000 and forged grain certificates and larceny. Governor Baker, on the strength of the requisition, issued a warrant for the arrest of the accused.

Whitehead has been locked up but a short time when he obtained a writ of habeas corpus from the Fifth District Court, which is made returnable this morning at eleven o'clock.

The place was on Customhouse street, between Franklin and Trempe. Boudro was at once taken to the Charity Hospital, and Kelly escaped. Mr. P. T. Holland was arrested at the time on mere suspicion of complicity in the assault, but it really turns out that he was acting Good Samaritan, for which piece of kindness he has suffered quite severely.

DEATHS LAST WEEK.—Dr. G. W. Dirmeyer, Secretary of the Board of Health, reports in the whole number of internments for the week ending Sunday morning 106. This is an increase. Three died of congestion of the brain, 3 consumption, 2 pneumonia, 2 softening of the brain, and 9 were stillborn. 244, four were males, 30 females, and 4 infants. Eighty-two were whites, 19 blacks, 2 mulattoes, and 3 not stated.

WARRANT OF LIFE, BY SORRY TO DIE.—John Ryan was yesterday arrested by Recorder Gastinel on an accusation that he has attempted murder—self-murder, by jumping into the cold and muggy Mississippi and persisting in drowning himself, but he was thwarted in his suicidal effort. When questioned as to the motive that prompted suicide he stated that he was weary of life, but now was sorry to die. He had been peddling pork and trides on the levee, and his companion betrays John Boudro.
