INDICTED BY THE UNITED STATES GRAND JURY.—Charles Cayenac, one of the election commissioners arrested by United States Commissioner Shannon for alleged false arrests and false imprisonment of Republican voters, and soon after released by the arbitrary authority of General Buchanan, who thereby proved his subservience to the rebels, is now under bonds of \$2000 to appear for trial when called upon, the grand jury of the United States Circuit Court having found a true bill against him.
