THE SEYMOUR MOVEMENT.

The nomination of Seymour and Blair by the Copperheads, rebels, Democrats, and Conservatives lately assembled at New York, has been received with a cold indifference, if not an absolute disgust, by the great rank and file of the Democratic party.

With a reduction of one-half in the amount of work ordered to be done, and a rather unpleasant lowering of prices in many important particulars, the proposed printing bill offers to the people and State of Louisiana the most economical measure on the subject of public printing that has been offered to the Legislature for a quarter of a century.

It appears from late telegrams to the Western press that the leading Democrats of New York city held a meeting on the eleventh and agreed among themselves that they would be able to carry the following States at the next election.

general but wholly unsupported assertions, the majority of the members of the House hesitated to vote for it until they had time to investigate it for themselves.

When it is known that it is mainly copied from the law passed by the Legislature of 1866, modified to meet the mandates of the new constitution by excluding the usual publications in the French language, and making some reductions from the very full prices allowed by the last law, the question will naturally arise, why is the new bill so violently assailed?

There is hardly sufficient variation in the prices of job and book work between the two bills to require a detailed comparison. One or two items of the new bill fix the prices a trifle higher than the old law; but the greater part of the specifications call for a reduction in charges.

The old law allowed the State Printer one dollar a square for publishing the proceedings; the price fixed by the new bill is the same. The proceedings of both Houses, and the laws and resolutions of the General Assembly were ordered to be inserted one time, but never more than one time, so that all the publishing in the official journal cost the State just twice as much as the same will cost under the new bill.

The reasons for designating by law a paper wherein should be published all judicial advertisements were so well set forth by one of the journals published in this city in 1866 by a gentleman who is now a distinguished member of the Senate, that it is hardly necessary for us to repeat them.

As to the price of judicial advertising, the law requires a Sheriff's sale, a Constable's sale, or a notice of any process from a court to be published a certain number of times within a given number of days, at intervals.

This much for his clever impertunity. As for his misfortune, it is authoritatively stated that having dropped from the extreme views of Democracy, and falling among violent apostles of his half-abandoned creed, his reconversion to the true faith was attempted by the carnal weapons of brass-knuckles and brawny fists.

It is the duty of our Legislature to foster every public enterprise of this kind in the State. Let us encourage capital from the North for this purpose.

This is common ground upon which Federals and Confederates can unite. While we grow enthusiastic over great canals and railroads and schemes of material progress, old hatreds and prejudices will be forgotten, and partisan strife lose its bitterness.

It will be seen by our dispatches that N. Paige, formerly of the REPUBLICAN, has been elected State printer by the North Carolina Legislature.

At a Democratic radical meeting at Richmond, Virginia, Saturday night, Governor Vance declared that what the Confederacy fought for would be won by the election of Seymour and Blair.
