PROCEEDINGS OF THE SENATE YESTERDAY

Eligibility Bill Passed in the House.

Bill Passed Empowering the Governor to Fill Vacancies.

SENATE.

First Day's Session.

SATURDAY, August 15, 1868.

The Senate was called to order by the President at eleven o'clock.

The roll was called; present the following members:

On motion of Mr. O'Hara, the reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Mr. Ray, from the Committee on the Judiciary, reported a substitute for Senate bill No. 20, an act to suppress, prevent, and punish the stealing of fruit and grain.

Favorably upon House bill No. 20, an act to regulate the practice and the dispatch of business in the District Courts of New Orleans.

Mr. Ray, from the Committee on Internal Improvements, reported favorably upon Senate bill No. 37, an act to amend an act entitled an act incorporating the Louisiana Central Steam of the Mississippi and Pacific Railroad Company.

Mr. Darrell, from the Committee on Enrollments, reported as duly enrolled an act relative to the revision of the statutes of the State generally.

Mr. Wilcox, from the Committee on Federal Relations, made the following report:

COMMITTEES ON SENATE BILLS, &c. To the Honorable Senate, August 15, 1868.

SENATE.—Your Committee to which was referred a communication from his Excellency, the Governor, transmitting a communication from Charles Bernard, Captain and Acting Governor of the United States, forwarded by Major General R. O. Buchanan, with accompanying plans, etc., requesting the same to be laid before the Legislature, and asking that the jurisdiction over certain lands therein referred to be ceded to the United States, respectfully report that a joint resolution relating to the United States jurisdiction over lands in the State of Louisiana set apart for national cemeteries, and the public school lands, and the body of the public school lands, and the same to be laid before the Senate for its consideration on the twelfth August, 1868, covering the same lands and interests of the public school lands, and described in the communication and plans herewith submitted.

Your committee, therefore, recommend that said communication be laid before the Senate by the Secretary of the Senate to the House of Representatives, for the further information of that body.

RESOLUTIONS.

Mr. O'Hara: I wish to present the following resolution:

Resolved, That a joint committee be appointed, consisting of two members from the Senate and three from the House, to investigate and report on the disposition made of the public school lands of the State, and of the money raised for the purposes of public education in the city of New Orleans. And be it further enacted, that said joint committee be empowered to send for persons and papers.

Mr. O'Hara: I move that the rules be suspended to take up the resolution.

Mr. Bacon: I move that the question be put, "Shall the bill be rejected?"

The Senate rejected the bill by a rising vote of 14 yeas, 7 nays.

Mr. Ray: I wish to offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That a joint committee of two from the Senate and three from the House be appointed to examine the records of conveyances, and ascertain their condition, and what there is anything necessary to be done to prevent and remedy the same, and to report according to circumstances.

Mr. Ray: I ask for a suspension of the rules to introduce a bill.

Rules suspended.
