THE INSANE ASYLUM OF MARIGNY STREET. On the corner of Marigny street and Love, in an old but once stately mansion occupied by Governor Murphy, and a place once familiar to the present Emperor of France, Louis Napoleon, is now situated the Insane Asylum of New Orleans.

The building was leased for the purpose for which it is now occupied about three years ago, and has been under the superintendence of several gentlemen during that period, who have generally given good satisfaction so far as is known to the outside world.

The asylum is at present under the superintendence of Mr. J. O. Logan, who with the assistance of his amiable lady, Dr. P. S. Pastel, chief clerk, H. Clark, day officer, Eugene Tholoy, night officer, and John Brown, nurse and janitor, certainly are deserving of a large share of public gratitude for the untiring efforts made to render the condition of the one hundred and thirty-two unfortunate as comfortable as circumstances will admit of.
