THE CITY COUNCIL - Board of Aldermen

A special meeting was called last night by the Mayor, who summoned both Boards into his parlor. The Board of Aldermen, with the exception of Mr. Poynot, met in the parlor in secret session. Mr. Poynot objected to this mode of operation and positively refused to go in. He said he was in favor of letting the people know what was being done by the Council. These objections were met by the Mayor, who said that the Council had no right to summon the Board to his private rooms for the purpose of transacting public business.

THE HOUSEHOLD CLUB, ALGIERS

On Thursday evening the streets of Algiers were illuminated by what Mr. Sherburne might call an equestrian cavalcade in the interests of Democracy. About forty horses, each accompanied with a torch, were seen marching up and down for the space of two hours. These horses paraded along with a grave and business air, mingled with an occasional look of perplexity, as if they wondered what it was all about. The whole thing was a negative affair, judging from the neighs heard among the members of the procession. Each horse had a man on its back to carry the torch.

SENTENCES IN THE CRIMINAL COURT

Moses Harvey and Bill Johnson, burglarly and larceny, the former to two years Penitentiary and the latter to three years. John Louis alias Thomas Price, larceny, one year Penitentiary. George Washington and Henry Jeter, larceny, six months each Penitentiary. Theodore Duboual, obtaining money under false pretenses, and Nelson Jordan, wounding, six months each Penitentiary. Francisco Vallotti, stabbing with intent to commit murder, seven years Penitentiary. New trial was granted in the case of Charles Precas alias Freccup.

NOTES IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

In the House yesterday Mr. Noble, of Orleans, moved to strike out section four of the bill to amend the charter of the city of Jefferson, which provides for the removal of the present city officers, and the appointment of other city officers by the Governor. He alluded to what he termed the tendency of legislation in this Assembly to take away power from the people and confer it upon the Governor. The same thing, he said, had been done in reference to the city of Alexandria. The present incumbents were elected by the people in violation of the late constitutional convention, and were entitled to the places to which they were chosen until the term for which they were elected expired. He appealed to the majority of the House not to take this power from the people.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR TO-NIGHT'S DEMOCRATIC PROCESSION

Major Williamson and his subordinates have perfected their arrangements for attending to the welfare of the city to-night. There will be a squad of mounted police who will travel with the procession for apparent objects. Both day and night men will be on duty, well instructed in all points. The Grand Marshal has agreed to detail a certain number of men from each club who will render the police every assistance in case of necessity. In case of fire alarm everything has been attended to, in order that the procession will not be interrupted. Every station fire-box will be well guarded, to prevent a false alarm being rung.
